

A small neighbourhood battle — and online comment

war — ensued after the removal of four benches from the corner of Alexander and Church streets in November 2011. What might have been viewed as an inconvenience for those who used the rather uncomfortable concrete seating was seen by many as an attempt to alter the personality of the Church-Wellesley Village.

Two years later, those who mourned the loss of the Alexander Street benches now have a number of new places to park their rear ends. The Church-Wellesley Village Business Improvement Area and the 519 Church Street Community Centre (with support from Councillor Kristyn Wong-Tam) recently teamed up to create several new street-side patios — or "parklets" — for Church Street. The 519's Matthew Cutler says the team modelled them after similar patios used on Yonge Street last summer during the Celebrate Yonge event. In fact, the Church Street patios are far superior.

Unlike the Yonge Street seating, which felt a bit too close to traffic for comfort, the pink-and-orange patios on Church Street have been built facing away from the road, toward the strip's businesses. They offer a variety of seating and have been parked in front of bars, restaurants and shops such as Pusateri. It's an innovative, community-building initiative that's already seen success in cities like Halifax, Vancouver and New York.

And it's a much better way for the BIA to spend its money than on one-off events — such as a sidewalk sale — that its members had previously proposed. With this scheme, the City of Toronto and the BIA seem to be dipping their toes in the water, assessing whether Church Street — like Montreal's Sainte-Catherine Street — is ready to become a pedestrian-only strip for a few months each year, which is why we should all get out and show them it is.

Drink, tan, cruise, plan a parklet picnic—it's now up to the residents of the city's gay village to prove we actually deserve the neighbourhood we so often complain we don't have.

Urban studies theorist Richard Florida writes in *Who's Your City* that the aesthetics of a city — "its physical beauty and natural

amenities" - are public goods that should be used and enjoyed by the public. I hope it's possible to coerce more Torontonians outside to get pleasure from our city. For some reason, many haven't caught on to this idea, nor has Toronto caught up with European cities when it comes to citizens making use of public space. At the hint of a rare glimmer of summer sun, Londoners rush to Soho Square, in the heart of that city's gay village, to enjoy a game of Frisbee or lunch on the grass with colleagues. Each evening after dinner, most Italians wander through their cobblestone streets for la passeggiata, a social ritual that persists even though Italians have as many television and iPhone screens to distract them as we do.

There's no good reason that Cawthra Park, Allan Gardens or Queen's Park are not as vibrant and busy as the parks of Europe. A common complaint is that downtown streets and parks are filled with "dangerous" people: drug dealers, pimps and such. But Europe's cities have as many (or even more) of these elements. The only reason they're more visible on our streets and in our parks is because the rest of us are not using these spaces. Crime is down in Toronto, which remains one of the world's safest places to live. One way to keep it down is to continue to improve our neighbourhoods using the approach known as crime prevention through environmental design (CPTED). This development model employs the use of natural surveillance by encouraging the creation of outdoor spaces with benches, tables and parks that promote social interaction.

It is exactly why, instead of lobbying to remove the Alexander Street benches, the residents of the Alexus condo should have lobbied for even more seating there. The knee-jerk bunker mentality that is increasingly common among Village residents is not befitting of Canada's largest and most diverse city. If you don't like lively streets, you probably shouldn't buy a condo on one. The more people who utilize our public spaces, the more vibrant—and safe—our city will be. Kudos to the BIA, Wong-Tam and The 519 for realizing this and for their latest positive contribution to the growth of the gaybourhood. Now let's get out and use those parklets.


Turkey Pride

Lesbian couple married at the Canadian Lesbian and Gay Archives

Pair wanted their wedding to tackle queer-history amnesia

As many younger gays and lesbians venture far from Church Street and write giddy polemics about how post-gay they feel, one couple demonstrated its commitment to the Village, the LGBT community and each other by marrying at the Canadian Lesbian and Gay Archives (CLGA) this summer.


Selina Abetkoff admits she hadn't heard of the CLGA until her partner, Ilaneet Goren, suggested it as a wedding venue. Abetkoff is not alone, and spreading the word was one of the reasons the couple chose to wed there.

The CLGA started 40 years ago as a single filing cabinet in the office of *The Body Politic*. Today, it has grown into the world's second-largest LGBT archives, offering photos, audio-visual materials, memorabilia and an international collection of queer and trans periodicals, all squeezed into its yellow-brick Victorian on Isabella Street and a second storage space at Church and Wellesley.

"The archives has so many hidden treasures that I'm sure are just here to be discovered," says general manager Scott Kettles. He lists R Douglas Elliott's papers documenting the fight for same-sex marriage and Mark Tewksbury's 100th anniversary commemorative Olympic torch among his personal favourites.

The couple's timing was perfect for the archives, which had never hosted a wedding before: 2013 marks not only its 40th anniversary, but 10 years of same-sex marriage in Ontario.

Abetkoff and Goren infused every aspect of the event with their values, ensuring that queerfriendly businesses supplied the services and refreshments and acknowledging in their speeches that legal same-sex marriage is still the exception globally. They also served rainbow cupcakes in lieu of wedding cake.



"It's the highlight of my time at the archives," says Kettles, who worked closely with the couple on the wedding. "It was very emotional, very beautiful."

At the time, the second-floor gallery was featuring an exhibit about Rupert Raj, active in the trans community since the 1970s, and Richard Hudler, a long-time social worker and activist in London.

Goren says one of the wedding's highlights was seeing her grandmother, who had lived through Soviet repression, dancing and clapping at her gay wedding, surrounded by queer and trans artifacts. Similarly for Abetkoff, one of the most powerful moments was watching her parents interact with the edgier pieces.

"I don't want them to see some sterilized version of what queer culture is . . . I'm rather vanilla as a lesbian," Abetkoff jokes, "but I celebrate the people who are boundary pushers."

Having lobbied for marriage equality a decade earlier, Goren felt like the wedding was a culmination of that work, though she had been conflicted about marriage as an institution and hadn't expected to get married herself. In fact, when the couple first started dating, one of Goren's favourite T-shirts read, "Single is the new black." (Abetkoff insists Goren even wore this on one of their early dates.) But when Abetkoff proposed — seconds after the couple crossed the Pride and Remembrance Run finish line — Goren said yes.

"The selling point for me was when she said, 'It will be what we want it to be. It will be ours,'" Goren says.

The wedding was a celebration of the progress that has been made but also a reminder of the work yet to be done, and the couple feels the Village, as a physical space, has an important role to play in this, even as the city beyond grows more welcoming.

"I wanted to live in a place in Toronto where I can walk around with my girlfriend holding hands, and I can take that for granted for a change," Goren says. "I can't do that, necessarily, in other parts of the GTA, outside of those queer-positive pockets. Still. We still have a long way to go."

The CLGA's current exhibit, Gay Premises: Radical Voices in the Archives, 1973–1983, features photos, cartoons and news items from contributors to The Body Politic and runs until Friday, Sept 6. For more information, go to clga.ca.

Friends for Life raises \$1.5 million

More than 400 people set off from Toronto on a 600-kilometre journey July 28 to raise a record \$1.5 million for the Toronto People with AIDS Foundation (PWA).

This year marked the 15th anniversary of the six-day Friends for Life Bike Rally, and many past riders returned to celebrate the milestone. Thirteen of the original 25 cyclists from 1999 rejoined the cause.

"It's a very emotional bike rally," says Robert Tomas, director of philanthropy and communications at PWA. "The bike rally moniker is Friends for Life, and in many cases it seems to be true," he says.

Organizers worked to attract a record number of riders to raise a record amount of money this year. They put together a retrospective exhibit detailing the fundraiser's history at the Canadian Lesbian and Gay Archives in the spring and got city councillors spinning outside city hall to boost registration and donations.

Over the last 15 years, Friends for Life has raised more than \$10 million for PWA, accounting for 35 to 40 percent of its annual revenue. "Without the bike rally, the PWA as it is today would not exist," Tomas says. -Andi Schwartz

Canadian Olympic Committee will not condemn Russia's anti-gay laws

The executive director of the Canadian Olympic Committee (COC) thinks it would be inappropriate for the organization to take a stand on Russia's anti-gay laws.

Dimitri Soudas, who is Prime Minister Stephen Harper's former spokesperson, says he trusts the International Olympic Committee's guarantees that Russian officials will not enforce the country's anti-gay laws during the Olympics.

"For a host country, the values that $the\,Olympic\,Games\,bring\,are\,powerful$ and they are lasting," Soudas says. "But for us as the national Olympic committee or the IOC, we don't comment on



legislation in other countries. That is the role of the government of Canada."

Soudas says he's "received assurances" from the IOC that Russian officials will not enforce the country's anti-gay laws. "The IOC has stated that it opposes in the strongest terms any move that would jeopardize the principle of sport as a human right to all regardless of race, gender, sexual orientation. The Canadian Olympic Committee fully supports that."

Despite these assurances, reports out of Russia claim that the authors of the anti-gay legislation have not agreed to a two-week moratorium and that police will continue to enforce the laws, even against athletes and tourists. One Russian sports minister says that while he welcomes gay athletes to participate in the Sochi Games, he warns they must obey the country's new laws banning "gay propaganda," according to an Aug 1 report from Pink News. In Russia, "gay propaganda" is any public pro-gay speech or behaviour.

Soudas says that so far there is no official position on whether athletes should speak out, display rainbow flags, make statements or wear rainbow pins on their uniforms.

'We take the safety of the entire Olympic community very seriously," he says. "The safety of our team is our top priority. In preparation for the games, our team, including myself, we have visited Sochi many times. We also work closely with the RCMP, the Sochi organizing committee, the Canadian

government here in Ottawa. We do that to ensure the safety."

But reassuring words from the IOC and officials like Soudas have done little to appease many in the queer community who remain outraged at Russia's crackdown on gay rights. Activists in Toronto joined an international day of protest Aug 3 when they marched on the Russian consulate. Another group is planning to send a shipment of dildos to Russian President Vladimir Putin. Meanwhile, a boycott of Russian vodka continues to gain momentum.

These activists have been joined by a coalition of international LGBT sports organizations, which is demanding that the IOC host a Pride House during the Sochi Games. The Russian government previously banned any Pride House at the Sochi Games. The group includes GayWhistler, the European Gay and Lesbian Sport Federation, the Federation of Gay Games, Pride Sports UK and United for Equality in Sports and Entertainment, among others.

Pride Houses provided safe spaces for LGBT people and their allies at both the Vancouver and London Olympic games. New Zealand speed skater Blake Skjellerup, who plans to wear a rainbow pin at the Sochi Games, says visiting the Pride House in Vancouver gave him the courage to come out and be a role model. —Andrea Houston

The politics of hate

On the same weekend Torontonians took part in a glorious 2013 Pride parade, gays in Saint Petersburg were also marching - except their demonstration ended with beatings and arrests.

The group was protesting the unanimous passage of a new anti-gay law in Russia that bans "gay propaganda" in order to "protect minors."

But anyone following news out of Russia can see it's not minors who need protecting. Over the last month a steady stream of anti-gay horror stories have filled my Facebook wall: Russian neo-Nazi sociopaths using the internet to lure gay youth so they can torture them; gangs of skinheads forcing gays to pose for humiliating pictures or drink urine. In May, a gay man died after thugs raped him with broken bottles and bashed his head in with a rock.

Russia denies gay and lesbian people their right to speak and love freely, their right to protest and their right to exist. Even showing a rainbow flag in public is a criminal offence.

There is no mistaking what is happening in Russia; the world has seen it before.

Russian lawmakers have made gay people scapegoats for some of the country's problems — not unlike the way leaders in Nazi Germany blamed the Jews for Weimar Germany's economic difficulties. (President Vladimir Putin has even blamed gays for Russia's declining birthrate.)

Next year Russia will become the centre of the world's attention for more than two weeks when it plays host to the Winter Olympics. Russian gays and their international allies must take advantage of the Olympic spotlight and use every tactic to fight back against the country's increasingly anti-gay culture. And if the perfect pageantry of the Games is tainted in the process, so be it.

There is a long history of politics merging with the Olympics. Organizers cancelled the Games altogether during the Second World War. When Moscow hosted in 1980, the United States, West Germany, China, the Philippines, Argentina and Canada all boycotted. When Los Angeles hosted in 1984, the Soviet Union and 14 of its allies boycotted.

The Games have also been used as a propaganda tool, In 1936, Hitler opened the Berlin Games with a Nazi salute. For two weeks, the Olympics camouflaged

his racist, militaristic dictatorship. The world was silent.

Two black Olympic champions used their golden moment in 1968 in Mexico City to hold their fists high in the air - anod to the Black Panthers, who were fighting for civil rights.

Olympians going to Sochi from privileged, Western democracies have a responsibility to speak up, carry rainbow flags and talk about gay rights every chance they get. To say nothing is to be complicit in the hatred.

American figure skater Johnny Weir. whose husband is Russian, recently told CNN that he's not a political leader and "just being there" as an openly gay man is enough. "For me to go and wave a rainbow flag goes against my own personal principles," he said, adding, "I am not a propagandist."

In Canada, straight Olympic athletes have spent the summer crisscrossing the country to march in various Pride parades - a first for the Canadian Olympic Committee. But the reality is that visibility is simply not enough. It's not enough to go to Sochi and compete as if everything is normal. It's not enough



just to wear a little rainbow pin on a lapel, and it's insulting for athletes (gay or straight) to dismiss demands for further activism and claim that "the Olympics aren't political."

At the very least, the International Olympic Committee should encourage gay-friendly countries like Canada to host Pride Houses in Sochi. It should also urge athletes to carry rainbow flags at the opening ceremonies alongside their national flags, Putin's laws be damned.

The IOC barred South Africa from 1964 to 1991 because of its apartheid policies, yet it won't weigh in now. Former NBA player John Amaechi told the National Post's Bruce Arthur that the IOC refuses to stand up for human rights. "They have no backbone. Look, [South Africa] was perhaps the only notable, noble thing that the IOC has ever done. It's the only outspoken, outstanding, political move that made them, for just a brief moment, worth their existence... They're explicitly saying that

[not] being racist is important, we won't allowit, but being homophobic is okay."

Vodka boycotts should be only the first step to get people talking. We have their attention - let's use it to make demands. All organizations and individuals attending the Olympic Games must exercise their freedom of expression and stand with Russian LGBT activists demonstrating in Sochi. Corporate sponsors also need to start raising hell about the fact that their brands are being used to support bigotry.

Berlin 1936 is now known as "the Nazi Olympics." Let's not let this moment pass us by. Sochi 2014 should be remembered as the "Gay Rights Games."

Canadian Foreign Affairs Minister John Baird finally let loose with harsh words for Russia on Aug 1. Canadian leaders should follow his example next month at the G20 summit in Putin's hometown of Saint Petersburg.

While the 19th-century law used against the Magnotta snuff-video website owner is rarely seen in the courts, it is often wielded at the Canadian border

Dudley Do-Right has once again stepped in to save the preciously fragile Canadian morality.

Mark Marek, proprietor of all things gruesome, by way of his website Best Gore, has long clung to the fringes of the internet, purveying images of horrible car accidents, suicide and mutilation. But last year he found the gore jackpot: the alleged Luka Magnotta snuff film. The video went up and the response was a mix of horror, disgust and morbid fascination.

It didn't take long for the Mounties to get their morally deprayed man. Problem is, they didn't appear to have any laws to charge him with. Hosting a link to a violent film isn't exactly a crime.

But on July 16, Marek appeared be-

century laws being used against a murder video on a website?"

Cossman says the history of the law is pretty sordid. Its modern lineage comes out of a case in the late 1980s against Winnipeg porn proprietor Donald Butler. Police charged him with dozens of counts of distributing obscene material. The case made its way through the court system before coming before the top judges in the land. They decided on a harm test: pornography could be considered criminally obscene if it involved violence or undue degradation or dehumanization, but porn that did not fall under those characteristics, generally, was a rather inane type of obscene.

That definition of harm, Cossman notes, is still very "amorphous."

From then on, the law was used infrequently, usually on "weird and stupid things," she says. That's because the

On his blog, Marek makes the case that his website warns viewers against violence. What he shows his readership, he argued on a now-deleted blog post, is akin to what the Government of Canada does in designing cigarette packages to curb smoking. The difference, he argues, is that Ottawa targets children specifically, whereas his site has two levels of disclaimers to warn users of the site's gruesome content.

That test of harm seems more designed for Québécois artist Rémy Couture, a filmographer renowned for his hyper-realistic special effects and makeup that has tricked more than one casual internet-goer into thinking that his home movies are real snuff films. Couture was brought up on charges of contributing to the corruption of morals, as the Crown alleged his work was not a professional trade, but rather a sick sexual fetish. A Montreal jury acquitted him in December.

Legal experts expect Marek to get off as well, as there is little physical evidence tying him to the posting of the video — only that he owns the site.


But while Marek and Couture provide two rare examples of this provision being used through the Criminal Code, it is often wielded at the Canadian border.

The prohibited-importations unit, a section of the CBSA, is the body responsible for determining whether titles — be they shipped or in personal possession — are a hazard to the sensibilities of Canada. Its responsibility is to determine if the imported titles contravene the Criminal Code — whether they fall under the guise of hate speech or if they're inadmissible under Tariff 9899.

The Orwellian-sounding tariff is a ban on any material that, under Section 163(8) of the Criminal Code, tends to "corrupt morals." Specifically, "any publication a dominant characteristic of which is the undue exploitation of sex, or of sex and any one or more of the following subjects, namely, crime, horror, cruelty and violence, shall be deemed to be obscene."

The Canadian government has taken that to mean most things involving urine, scat, simulated violence, roleplay incest and a whole host of illustrated content.

The CBSA releases quarterly lists of all those titles confiscated at the border — virtually all of them pornography, and many of them gay. Once confiscated, they're sent to Ottawa, where bureaucrats determine whether they're an acceptable import or contributing to the moral decline of Canada.

As *Xtra* reported in 2009 when the CBSA banned Raging Stallion Studios' fetish flick *Piss Off*, CBSA has been turning off porn producers and fans alike with its censorship of their raunchy films.

But it's not always hardcore porn that gets caught in this dragnet — in two cases CBSA officials held entrants to Canadian queer film festivals.

A spokesperson told *Xtra* that "CBSA officers have the legal authority under Section 99 of the Customs Act to examine personal baggage, conveyances and goods upon arrival into and on departure from Canada. This could include the examination of electronic storage devices that may contain obscene material, hate propaganda or child pornography."

For example, if you plan on coming across the border with a DVD copy of *Urine Fist Fest*, you'd better think again. Though if you have *Bound*, *Bagged and Gagged*, you'll probably be all right.

fore an Edmonton judge under Section 163 of the Criminal Code: Offences Tending to Corrupt Morals. It is the second time the otherwise-forgotten law has been used in the past two years, sparking a flashpoint in the debate on the limits of freedom of expression.

Brenda Cossman has long followed the legality of obscenity, smut and corrupt morals in Canada. She is an *Xtra* contributor and a University of Toronto professor, as well as the director of the Mark S Bonham Centre for Sexual Diversity Studies. She tells *Xtra* that use of that section of the Criminal Code essentially stopped in the past decade as the legal system moved on to other, more serious, issues of exploitation, such as child pornography.

So when the news came out, Cossman's first reaction was, "Oh my god, I have to put my obscenity hat back on?"

She then penned an editorial for *The Globe and Mail* asking, "Why are 19th-

Supreme Court had failed to base the socalled harm test on anything more than the judge's inclination or feeling. That was remedied later, in the early 2000s, when they set out a need to furnish the court with evidence of societal or direct harm. The test was properly set out in the Labaye case, in which the Quebec government tried to charge a group of swingers for indecency and operating a brothel. The court decided that the government had an onus to prove that obscene material infringes on a person's freedom ("blasting porn on Yonge and Dundas," as Cossman puts it), contributes to anti-social or sexist behaviour in the public, or physically harms the person depicted in the material.

Marek's case, evidently, falls under the latter provision.

But the tape that Marek posted to Best Gore wasn't exactly pornography — it was, allegedly, real. That makes this case "new and cutting edge," Cossman says.

But it's not quite as clear-cut as it sounds. *Mommy & Me 2*, for example, is permitted. *Seduced By Mommy 3*, on the other hand, is a non-starter and will be confiscated at the border. *Bizarro Sex Loops Volume 26* is banned, but *Volume 25* is allowed.

Most of the titles on the list are DVDs, but CBSA regularly confiscates literature — romantic novels detailing incest, comics that appear to feature some man-on-monkey action, and one comic entitled *After School Slave Club*. All were deemed inadmissible. Two magazines — editions of *Stroke* and *Studflix* — are generally allowed in, although one edition of *Stroke* has been banned.

"CBSA officers are trained in investigative, examination and questioning techniques," the spokesperson told Xtra. "A number of risk-based indicators guide officers in making the decision to refer goods and individuals for further examination or investigation." No clarification of exactly what those indicators are was provided.

When material is confiscated, the importer will receive a written reason as well as the option to appeal.

One former CBSA employee, who chose to remain anonymous because former employees are not at liberty to discuss department guidelines, told *Xtra* via email that "there's a long list [of prohibited titles] that gets updated." She says those titles are "seized and destroyed, no questions asked."

She went on to say that guidelines are vague, yet the guards are told that things like spitting or urination are strictly off-limits. But, she says, there is plenty of "grey area."

"Officers apply the guidelines more or less liberally, depending on their perspective," she says.

The former CBSA employee says that some Canadians are flagged for having "questionable materials." She remembers the case of one professor whose work led him to being flagged, where the other agents "were at the ready to arrest this man as a pedophile before he arrived," she says. He was prepared: he had letters from the university and the conference he was presenting at, confirming that he was not a pervert. He was released, "to the disappointment of many."

One of the more famous cases of Canada's obscenity laws being used at the border is that of the Little Sister's bookstore in Vancouver. The store brought a constitutional challenge after numerous shipments of queer erotica were stopped at the border, spanning a decade. That case would go on to the Supreme Court in 2005 and help redefine how the laws on corrupting morals would be defined in Canada.

The majority of the justices found that "it is fundamentally unacceptable that expression which is free within the country can become stigmatized and harassed by government officials simply because it crosses an international boundary, and is thereby brought within the bailiwick of the Customs department... Their freedom of expression does not stop at the border."

In the end, the justices agreed that the obscenity tariff should be upheld but that the onus should be on the government to prove that the goods are obscene. Previously, it was up to those with the goods to prove that their material was fit for Canada's delicate sensibilities.

So if you're driving across the border, clutching your original 1999 first press of *Dad Does It Best*, you'd better have a good hiding spot.

Gay teacher fired after wedding photos published

A gay teacher at a Catholic high school in Glendora, California, was fired because photos of his wedding appeared in a local newspaper, the *Los Angeles* Times reports.

Ken Bencomo and his partner were one of the first same-sex California couples married after the US Supreme Court struck down Proposition 8 in June.

School administrators had known that Bencomo was gay for about a decade but decided last month not to renew his contract because of the publicity generated by his wedding.

"Ken was one of the school's star educators and the decision to terminate him because he lawfully married a man is just heartbreaking to him - it's crushing," said Bencomo's attorney, Patrick McGarrigle. "It shows a terrible error of judgment and complete disregard of Ken and what he has brought to the

School administrators issued a statement saying that "while the school does not discriminate against teachers or other school employees based on their private lifestyle choices, public displays of behavior that are directly contrary to church teachings are inconsistent with [our] values." -Niko Bell

Dozens of gay couples wed in Minnesota as 13th state legalizes marriage

Margaret Miles and Cathy ten Broeke were married just seconds after midnight Aug 1 on the marble steps of Min-

neapolis City Hall, the first gay couple married in Minnesota.

Mayor RT Rybak officiated the ceremony, the Minneapolis Star Tribune reports.

Dozens of other Minnesota couples were married Aug 1 as the state became the 13th in the United States to legalize gay marriage.

Governor Mark Dayton signed the legalization bill in May, only months after Republicans barely failed to write a ban on gay marriage into the state constitution.

"You and all the LGBT community throughout Minnesota...had the courage to stand up and say we want the same rights as every other American," Dayton told a gathered crowd in Minneapolis on Aug 1. "It's a constitutional right, a moral right."

State officials expect 5,000 gay couples to marry in Minnesota this year. — Niko Bell

Montreal study finds non-traditional relationships on the rise

In contrast to the images of dyadic monogamy successfully mobilized in recent legal victories for gay marriage in the United States, non-traditional relationships - a category encompassing everything from couples who swing to polyamorous partnerships of three or more — are increasing in proportion to monogamous partnerships, according to research conducted through the Sexuality and Modern Intimate Ties and Networks (SMIT'N) project.

SMIT'N has collected more than 5,500 relationship surveys through its website. Lead researcher Martin Blais, of l'Université du Québec à Montréal's Department of Sexology, says that despite the growth in non-traditional relationships, the mystery surrounding their prevalence and how they function contributes to their stigmatization. "Non-traditional relationships are still seen as second-rate options that people engage in only because they cannot find a monogamous partner - and alarmist reactions in the media to the sexual precocity of youth only contribute to the impression that these relationships are dangerous," he says.

Blais says the historical growth of non-monogamous relationships in Quebec, where participation in the study has been greatest, is a move away from traditional institutions, particularly the Roman Catholic Church. As individuals no longer depended on traditional institutions, including the family, to fulfill basic needs, they began crafting relations that emphasize autonomy and opportunity for self-actualization. Often, this means multiple sexual partners.

Among the groups surveyed, gay men had the highest rate of "open relationships." Just less than one-third of gay men reported being in open relationships, and these men reported the highest rates of relationship satisfaction among all gay men.

Results show that those who seek traditional relationships prioritize security and structure, while those seeking or currently in non-traditional relationships are motivated to create relationships that enhance individual autonomy.

Blais was surprised by the frequency with which self-identifying heterosexuals and homosexuals described being attracted to members of the opposite sex. Instead of affirming the binary of hetero- and homosexual identities, data points to a more complex spectrum of attractions to both sexes among both gay and straight people.

SMIT'N is still recruiting participants, and its survey is available online. -Josh Mentanko

Persian poetry lovers

An 11th-century sultan and his beloved slave


Heterosexuality and monogamy are, to put it briefly, fairly recent developments, though love and devotion have been human concerns for eons. Religious leaders pushing "traditional marriage" have continuously failed to acknowledge a long history of non-monogamy and non-normative sexualities.

The famous Islamic leader Mahmud of Ghazni, an early-11th-century conqueror and the first ruler to carry the title "sultan," had nine wives and relationships with other women, though his polygamy is often overlooked in lieu of his relationship with a man named Ayaz.

Mahmud was born in 971, in the town of Ghazna, Khorasan (what is now Afghanistan). At the age of 23, he joined his father, a Turkic slave-soldier turned nation-founder, in military campaigns in the region. He eventually took over from his father and in the name of Islam continued to expand the Ghaznavid Empire into what is now eastern Iran and the northwest Indian subcontinent.

Less is known about Ayaz's early life. Likely born closer to the end of the 10th century, Ayaz was a Georgian-Turkish slave who ended up in Mahmud's court and became the sultan's favourite. In 1021, the sultan raised Ayaz to kingship, installing him on the throne of Lahore, a city in what is now Pakistan. Mahmud had burned the city to the ground and scattered most of the inhabitants because of a betrayal by the local government, so the freshly instated Malik ("King") Ayaz reconstructed Lahore from the ground up, creating what survives as the Walled City.

The relationship between Mahmud and Ayaz is highly celebrated in Persian poetry and literature. Sa'di, a 13th-century poet, includes two stories about the lovers in his best-known work, *Bustan*, a collection of reflections on human nature. The chapter "Concerning Love" describes someone complaining that Mahmud's favourite slave "possesses no beauty." Upon hearing this, Mahmud responds, "My love, O sir, is for virtue, not for form or stature." The second story depicts the king travelling with some of his men when an overturned chest of pearls is

discovered; all except Ayaz go after the pearls. Questioned by Mahmud about the possibility of gaining riches, Ayaz explains he wants nothing. "I walked in haste behind thee, I do not occupy myself with riches away from thy service."

Mahmud and Ayaz's relationship came to be an allegory of the highest ideal of (spiritual) love, devotion and fealty, be they to a god, king or lover. Chief among these virtues is restraint, as expressed in a story by Nidhami-I-Arudi, a 12th-century Ghaznavid court poet from Samarkand (what is now Uzbekistan). His story in the *Chahar Maqala* describes the "well known and famous" love of Mahmud for Ayaz, though he explains that Mahmud, being a "pious and God-fearing man," wrestled with this love. One night after drinking a lot of wine, Mahmud couldn't

ignore Ayaz's beauty: "Thereupon love plucked the reins of self-restraint from the hands of his endurance, and loverlike he drew him to himself."

A manifestation of his morals appears, warning Mahmud against acting on his love. Instead, the sultan takes a knife and orders Ayaz to cut off his beautiful hair. Mahmud wakes up the next morning, hung over and depressed by what he's done. A court poet is called, who comes up with this pithy verse: "Though shame it be a fair one's curls to shear/Why rise in wrath or sit in sorrowhere?/Rather rejoice, make merry, call for wine/When clipped the cypress doth most trim appear." Cheered considerably, Mahmud lavishes gold and silver on both the poet and his beloved. Mahmud's virtues are preserved, Ayaz has a new haircut, everyone wins.

While it's easy to romanticize chaste devotion in stories, it's harder to believe that lust didn't win out with real-life Mahmud and Ayaz. While homosexuality or polygamy might ruin Mahmud's chance of being a "pious and Godfearing man," Sa'di advises, "A devoted lover holds not back his hand from the object of his affections though arrows and stones may rain upon his head. Be cautious; if thou goest down to the sea, give thyself up the storm." Through Mahmud's love and devotion to Ayaz, in a narrative that would make Sa'di proud, the ruler is ruled by his slave.





With WorldPride coming in 2014, how does Toronto fare as a gay destination?

Toronto is the economic and cultural hub of Canada and was recently crowned the fourth largest city in North America, but does it have the pull to become the continent's next great travel destination? And can the city's vibrant

gay community be on the leading edge of a tourism renaissance?

With the imminent arrival of next year's WorldPride celebrations, there's no bet-

ter time to ask than now. Toronto has been posting annual tourism growth for much of the last decade, with overnight visits now reaching 9.8 million annually. The hotel occupancy rate is 10th in North America, even as new high-end and boutique hotels, such as the Ritz-Carlton, Trump, Four Seasons and Shangri-La, continue to open in the downtown core.

Tourism Toronto, the agency responsible for marketing the city around the world, has been aggressively courting the gay market since 2007, when it snagged its president and CEO David Whitaker from Miami. The organization hosts pages on its website, sectorontonow.com, dedicated specifically to LGBT travellers and aggressively promotes to gay communities in its target cities.

It's a strategy worth pursuing, according to data published in an Out Now travel market survey. Out Now predicts that the global travel market is worth \$181 billion (US) in 2013, up from \$70 billion in 2007. The same survey ranks Canada just 13th in volume of gay tourists, with an annual market value of \$6

Poland in the number of gay visitors it receives and just behind Spain's dollar share of the market.

And Toronto is failing in some important ways. Tourism Toronto's LGBT travel-information section has a nightlife page that encourages travellers to check out Zelda's, CiRCA, Slack Alice and Fuzion, all bars that have been closed for some time. But it neglects to mention the burgeoning queer scene in Kensington, Ossington, West Queen West and Parkdale. Meanwhile, despite nightlife being a chief attraction for visitors, city council has been work-

billion (US). That puts Canada behind | ing hard to limit the growth of the bar, club and restaurant industry in Toronto, with zoning exclusions and development moratoriums passed or proposed in nearly all of Toronto's hippest neighbourhoods.

Tourism Toronto is putting resources behind promoting next year's World-Pride festivities on its website and around the world as well. But how much that will pay off remains an open question. WorldPride has virtually no track record as a successful international event - each of its three previous iterations were marred by controversy and cancellations

Former Pride Toronto executive director Tracev Sandilands told City News after winning the WorldPride 2014 bid that she expected the event to bring in "five times" Pride's usual one million visitors. But even that number is misleading — when Pride organizers claim that one million people attend. they're counting visits to various Pride events throughout Pride week, not unique visitors from outside Toronto. Pride's own 2009 economic-impact study concludes that of 411,000 people who attended Pride, 303,000 were from the Toronto area.

While new executive director Kevin

Beaulieu is lowering expectations for the event, even his more conservative projections would be an enormous boost to Toronto tourism. "Because it's the first North American and fourth World-Pride ever, the travel patterns aren't established. We're expecting hundreds of thousands more visitors, up to two million visits to Pride," says Beaulieu, reached at Vancouver Pride, where he's promoting next year's party.

Pride Toronto will spend this year working toward ensuring that gay travellers around the world are aware of World-Pride. It's had representatives on the ground at major Pride festivities across North America, as well as São Paolo Pride and EuroPride, sent promotional materials to the smaller Prides, purchased ads in gay media, and is recruiting its volunteers and community members to reach out to their friends in other cities to invite them to the party. And its work is being supplemented by promotional work being done by Tourism Toronto and the Ontario Tourism Marketing Partnership at their regional offices around the world.

To help promote the city as a whole and boost the profile of WorldPride as an event, Pride is also working with the city's major cultural institutions to offer queer programming during the festival, and the city is working with neighbourhood associations to improve the Village, with its new parklets and the soon-to-launch mural project.

"The quality of the event is the first metric of success," Beaulieu says of expectations for WorldPride. "That means that people who arrived here understood that it was a special event... and the engagement of the community, whether Torontonians feel proud to have hosted it."

It's a hell of a town — and maybe the world capital of 'gay'

Most gay people, men especially, eventually end up in New York City, and with good reason. As the preeminent global centre of art, culture and commerce, The Big Apple has also emerged as the world capital of gay. Between the dazzle of Broadway, the old-school Hollywood romance of *Breakfast at Tiffany's* and Manhattan's star turn as the fifth lady of *Sex and the City*, New York City is virtually welded into every gay man's DNA, no matter where he's from.

In this rapidly changing city of eight million people, the gay visitor can be simply overwhelmed for choice, but here are a few must-dos.

If you're looking for an upscale and unique stay, get a room at **The Out NYC** (510 W 42nd St), New York's swanky "gay urban resort" in the Hell's Kitchen neighbourhood. The Out is designed for the gay or lesbian traveller who wants a sexy and luxurious stay in New York with other queer travellers.

My deluxe suite at The Out came equipped with a lush king-sized bed with floor-to-ceiling mirrored headboard, modern illuminated bedside cubes, big-screen television and a spacious work station. The designer bathroom is similarly swish, with plush towels, fully mirrored shower and a variety of The Out's own brand of luxury bath products on hand.

For those travelling in groups, The Out's unique quad bunk rooms offer the luxury at a fraction of the price. The beds are full-sized and separated with plush privacy curtains, and each has its own personal television set.

The Out also houses a full gym and spa, including hot tub, steam room and cedar sauna, with a team of trainers, masseurs and beauticians on hand for special sessions at reasonable prices.

During my stay I was invited to a complimentary and invigorating facial and manicure in the hotel's spa atrium, a warm and friendly space with cabanas and a soothing waterfall wall.

When you're ready to explore, take a short walk to Times Square — a mandatory stop on any New York visit. The

hustle and bustle of the square — and its incredible array of billboards — is a sight to behold, and the city's decision to close several streets through the square to make more room for performers and seating has really enhanced the experience.

Times Square is the best place to get a sense of what's going on in the Broadway theatre scene. Not only are half the major theatres along the square itself, but the giant TKTS booth offers discount dayof tickets to many of the biggest shows. For even better deals, it's worth going to the theatres directly — many offer rush tickets at steeply discounted prices.

For those with ravenous appetites for the performing arts, get off the main Broadway strip and dig into New York's more adventurous smaller theatres, where artists frequently tackle more daring subjects and styles. Some of my favourite venues in the city include the multidisciplinary Brooklyn Academy of Music complex (30 Lafayette Ave), Theatre Row (410 W 42nd St) and the Pershing Square Signature Centre (480 W 42nd St).

While New York is synonymous with theatre, the city is home to world-class arts of all kinds — from the stars of standup comedy, to live music and opera. Ticket hawkers will attempt to sell you on various comedy clubs as you pass them in Times Square. The discount tickets they offer aren't typically much better than buying at the door, but they're often emerging comedians who are working for the right to perform at the clubs they're promoting — be a sport and help one out. Be warned though: in addition to your ticket price, comedy clubs often have a two-drink minimum.

If you've had enough of the uptown scene, swing down to Greenwich Village

for the classic gay experience. A visit to the **Stonewall Inn** (51 Christopher St) is mandatory for the first-time visitor to New York. It was here that the modern gay rights movement was born on June 28, 1969, when a large group of gays, drag queens, trans people and hustlers spontaneously rioted to protest a police raid on the bar. The Stonewall still remains as a low-key joint with cheap drinks, drag queens and a charming community feel.

Up the street, the similarly long-lived **Duplex** (61 Christopher St) is a piano bar and cabaret with a bit more of a rollicking feel. Its cabaret performers are among the city's best and in the past have included such stars as Barbra Streisand and Woody Allen.

From here, you can't help but be tempted to stop in to **Big Gay Ice Cream** (61 Grove St). This kooky little shop started out as the Big Gay Ice Cream

Truck before expanding to two brickand-mortar locations (the other is in the East Village at 125 E 7th St). BGIC specializes in scrumptious soft-serve with wicked toppings and flavours, like ginger curry, curried coconut, cayenne chocolate or apple butter with bourbon butterscotch.

While you're indulging in naughty desserts, pay a visit to **Big Booty Bread Co** (261 W 23rd St) in Chelsea. The little bakery with the cheeky logo blends American standards with Latin American treats — the chocolate chip cookies are to die for, but try their specialty guava turnovers.

When it comes time to dance those extra calories away, you've no shortage of choices, with whole neighbourhoods like the West Village, Chelsea and Hell's Kitchen virtually synonymous with gay partying. But with a few exceptions —

The Monster (80 Grove St), **XL** (512 W 42nd St), **Boxers** (7429th Ave), the soon-to-close **Splash** (50 W 17th St; for more on its Aug 10 closing, see page 23) — Manhattan's bars are more of the stand, drink and cruise variety. Luckily, gay bars and clubs are springing up in the other boroughs. There's **Sugarland** (221 North 9th St) in Brooklyn's Williamsburg, while Roosevelt Avenue in Queens' Jackson

Heights has a string of gay clubs, including **True Colors** (7915 Roosevelt Ave), **Club Evolution** (7619 Roosevelt Ave) and the **Music Box** (40-08 74th St).

Looking for a more low-key night? Chelsea's **Gym Sportsbar** (167 8th Ave) attracts a blue-collar crowd of true sports fans, while **G Lounge** (225 W 19th St) and **Barracuda** (275 W 22nd St) have a friendly, low-key vibe, even Clockwise from left: the view from the top of the Rockefeller Center; the historic Stonewall Inn in Greenwich Village; the New York Pride march; the Broadway strip.

when G-Lounge is packed with hot muscular go-go boys grinding to pop and house beats.

The hip kids party in the East Village at Eastern Bloc (505 E 6th St) or The Boiler Room (86 E 4th St), but I found the alpha hipsters at Metropolitan (559 Lorimer St) in Williamsburg, a cozy little bar with live music and lots of tattooed, bearded and flannelled boys. But the coolest gay parties in New York will usually be the irregular ones thrown in mixed venues scattered around the city. If you're feeling adventurous, consult the local listings and get your butt out to that drag-performance party at a dive in Bushwick or the pop-up underwear party on Staten Island.

We've only scratched the surface of this incredible city — but that's another one of its joys. It's impossible to distill all of the great New York experiences into a single visit, so plan on coming back again and again.

MEMPHIS

Tennessee's lesser-known music town

While country capital Nashville offers a bold, brash take on Tennessee, Memphis, 212 miles to the southwest, strikes a more soulful chord. Music isn't the only thing to sing about round these parts; Tennessee also offers stunning mountain scenery, legendary barbecue, Southern comfort food and soul food. This is a state where you'll want to clock off the calorie count and tuck in.

Compared to the hundreds of kings buried in Memphis, Egypt, Tennessee's version has just one historic king interred — but one who wore jumpsuits far better than King Tut and his kin. Elvis's palatial pad Graceland (elvis.com/graceland) gives a dose of king and kitsch, plus décor tips you'll never forget — even if you try. If you're staying locally, Marlowe's Ribs (marlowesmemphis.com) will send a pink limo for you. The foyer contains a trove of barbecue trophies and a 2D cardboard Elvis in his gold-lamé stage.

Downtown Memphis is ramshackle, with a select few buildings slicked up for the tourists. A sign outside Flying Fish (flyingfishinthe.net) demands you "Get Your Tails in Here" for all-you-can-eat catfish specials. If you're not a fish fan, next door Automatic Slim's Tonga Club (automaticslimsmemphis.com) presents towering platters of onion fritters as tasty table centrepieces and dishes such as gumbo and pork chops with Delta Grind grits. Round the corner on famed Beale Street, birthplace of the blues, neon signs vie for attention along a couple of brightly lit blocks. BB King's Company Store (bbkingsclubs.com) blares blues. The Handy Bar (eatdrinkboogie.sitewrench.com/handypark), named for blues legend WC Handy, offers "Big Ass Beers to go." The bar next door promises "Biggest Ass Beers." On the same block sits Schwab's General Store. The stock is indeed general and lacks even a vaguely cohesive theme. Chipped ceramic kittens, cowboy hats and love potions jostle alongside sou-

venir mugs and eclectic knickknacks.

More genteel Southern society can be glimpsed at the venerable Peabody (peabodymemphis.com). However, at 11am or 5pm, things are a little different. At five, a liveried gentleman marches into the lobby and taps sharply on the marble fountain. Its inhabitants, five North American mallard ducks, hop out and march down an awaiting red carpet to the elevator. They reverse their journey in the morning. The tradition started in 1933 when the inebriated hotel manager returned from a hunting trip and filled the fountain with leftover live duck decoys.

For a more contemporary take on this Mississippi-side city, head for Midtown. You'll find a burgeoning arts scene around the 342-acre Overton Park (overtonpark.org) and worthwhile stops within, such as Rainbow Lake, Brooks Museum of Art (brooksmuseum.org) and Memphis Zoo (memphiszoo.org). Although the vivacious MidSouth Pride (midsouthpride.wordpress.com) will happen downtown on Saturday, Oct 15, in Robert Church Park and the Beale Street Entertainment District, it's Midtown that is Memphis's queer epicentre, home to the Gay and Lesbian Community Center (mglcc.org). In hip Cooper-Young, you'll find happening bars, record stores, bookshops and funky restaurants such as Soul Fish (soulfishcafe.com)

and Beauty Shop (thebeautyshoprestaurant.com) - housed in a 1960s salon with refurbished hair-dryer chairs. Each September, the Cooper-Young Festival (cooperyoungfestival.com), with its 400 artisans, attracts thousands.

Accommodations

Don't be fooled by the Graceland neighbourhood's sweet-sounding street names, such as Bluebird Road, Singing Trees Drive or Twinkletown Road: this is a purely functional part of town if Elvis stars on your itinerary and you're on wheels. Go all out and stay in the Heartbreak Hotel (elvis.com/graceland/heartbreak_hotel.aspx), where the desk clerks are, indeed, dressed in black. Downtown, The Peabody (peabodymemphis.com) is the perfect place to soak up the Old South. Across the river, the historicmeets-hip, super-basic Shack Up Inn (shackupinn.com) is a unique cluster of once-abandoned shotgun shacks and a cotton gin set on an old plantation.

Bars

Head to Midtown to measure up Memphis. The main venues include rambunctious sports bar The Pumping Station (thepumpingstationmemphis. com) and laid-back lesbian beer bar Dru's Place (drusplace.com).

NYC'S INFAMOUS SPLASH TO CLOSE

After more than 20 years, New York's renowned Splash dance club will close its doors Aug 10. The 17th Street landmark is legendary for its go-go-boy showers.

Splash owner Brian Landache made the announcement in a short public letter posted on Facebook:

To our loyal customers — For 22 years, it's been a privilege providing you with New York City's most exciting, safe and spectacular gay revue. Splash will permanently close at our location, 50 W 17 Street, on August 10, 2013. Please join us in our final countdown as we dismount the discoball with 10 magical farewell celebrations beginning August 1st. Thank you for the memories! Fondly, Brian and The Staff

"Once home to the city's only gogo boy showers, Splash weathered draconian anti-nightlife laws that shuttered other mega clubs, but has suffered now that the gays use hookup apps to connect rather than eye-to-eye bar room contact. The



opening of XL in Hell's Kitchen last year also drew away the twentysomething and tourist crowds essential to the club's lifeblood," Dan Avery writes, in his NewNowNext blog.

IBIZA'S MUSIC & CIRCUIT-PARTY SCENE

Like Mykonos in Greece, Ibiza is a summer gay resort that has risen to almost mythical status. Located about 80 kilometres from Valencia off the Spanish coast, Ibiza is one of the larger Balearic Islands.

"La Isla Blanca" is an incredibly beautiful place where visitors' days are usually spent frolicking on the beaches, and the nights are for legendary clubbing that lasts well past sunrise.

A healthy gay scene of bars, restaurants and cafés can be found in the town of Ibiza, around Carrer de la Verge, in the portside Sa Penya area, and in the old town, Dalt Vila (literally "upper town"), a UNESCO World Heritage Site that retains the medieval city walls. Large parts of the island are protected from development, so if you need to get away from the crowds, there are always places to enjoy eye-popping vistas in solitude.

Ibiza is world-renowned for its music scene. DJs come from around the globe to spin house and trance tunes for appreciative crowds. A large expat community from other EU countries



makes its home here, along with Latin Americans and Moroccans, giving the scene a very cosmopolitan feel.

They say that on summer weekends the parties are so perfectly spaced that one is always starting when the last is breaking up. Circuit party promoters follow people as they leave the big cities' heat to relax at coastal resorts, and the scene blazes through-

out July and August to wrap up in September. While July and August are the busiest months, many places are open in May, June and September, for those who prefer a quieter scene.



FRASER'S EDGE BRAD FRASER

I travelled a lot as a kid. It was not unusual

to come home from school to find that my "no impulse control" parents had packed our meagre belongs into a trailer and were waiting with the car running. We'd drive off to another

town, move into another house and start at a new school without really missing a beat.

We spent family holidays on endless drives between

BC and Alberta in a tiny vehicle containing two adults, four kids and at least two dogs. We sped through the truly horrifying two-lane highways that wound through the mountain roads - a steep cliff down one side and a steep cliff up the other — that connected the two provinces in the first half of the 1960s. Both parents smoked with the windows rolled up, and my father drank beer after beer, sticking his arm through the driver's window and heaving the empties across the roof of the car into the ditch on the other side of the road. We kids read comic books, played "eye spy" indifferently and mostly fought. I would curse my parents for being too cheap to buy the Gravol that other parents stuffed into their children to render them unconscious for such journeys.

When I was a teen, my fractured family finally settled in Edmonton, and there were a number of years with no travel at all as we were too broke to take anything like a holiday. The few times I returned to BC for a visit, it was on the Greyhound. Buses have never been the carriers of society's most cultured classes, and while I was sometimes titillated by the frisson of danger such a ride could involve, I remember most of it as nothing but endless boredom and stinky people.

There was a period when I was 20, after living in Edmonton for seven years, when I felt like I was trapped on a small island surrounded by a sea of farmland from which I'd never escape. Luckily, the theatre came to my rescue and, over the next 35 years, my travels would range across the country and around the world. While these trips were often business related, I usually found some

time for recreation. I'm still of the mind that the best way to experience a new place is to live, work and play with the locals. I've done a few of the "nice hotel/packaged re-

sort" things, and they all remind me of being at home but with better weather. I don't travel for weather; I travel for stimulation.

It does get tiring, though. There was a point in the last season of Queer as Folk when I was flying weekly between LA and Toronto, as well as whatever supplemental travel was required for the other things I was working on at the time. Playing with the locals isn't nearly as interesting when they all share the same bland, North American culture. A hotel of a certain price is the same no matter where you are. The gay bars and clubs I once loved to party at all started to feel the same no matter where I went. After the show wrapped, I started to turn down as many offers to work elsewhere as I could afford. When you're always working somewhere else, it can be very hard to become a part of the city where you actually live and the lives of your friends.

Over the last seven years, I've managed to reclaim my life in Toronto and establish a home again. It's been a welcome respite. But, like everything, that is now changing. If the career I've chosen for myself didn't already demand frequent change, life would anyway. The travelling, literally and metaphorically, is about to start again. My new play, Kill Me Now, is opening in Edmonton in early September, and I'm directing it. Despite my history in the city where I was born, this is my first professional premiere there. I find a sort of lovely symmetry about this, knowing I left Edmonton on my first commercial air flight to work on my first professional play in Toronto way back in 1981.

I've also been accepted to do a master's degree at the University of Toronto in the coming year and am in the process of signing my first publishing deal for a series of four novels. It's for these reasons, as well as a number of other professional obligations, that this will be my last column for a while. However, I will be back in the pages when something moves me to write and when I have the time, so it's not goodbye, it's just adieu.



Choreographed courtship

Though Michael Caldwell and Louis Laberge-Côté had been acquaintances for four years, it took an administrative mix-up to unite the dancer/choreographer couple. While on tour in 2007, their rooming assignments were switched mid-trip, and they found themselves bunking together for the final three weeks.

"I was so angry," Laberge-Côté says. "I didn't want to room with somebody I barely knew. But obviously, things turned out quite well in the end."

"Every night we would stay up, talking and getting to know each other," Caldwell adds. "When the tour was finished and we were back in Toronto, we decided a proper date would be prudent. A month later, it was clear we were together."

Less than a year later, they tied the knot in a backyard wedding but had no intentions of a conventional relationship. Extensive touring often kept them apart for long stretches, at one point for two years while Laberge-Côté worked with the Mannheim Ballet.

"This is the life of a dancer," Caldwell says. "You go where the work is. We're both loners by nature, so the idea of spending time apart was not as daunting as you might think."

Separation became a creative seed; their current work, *et même après (and even after)*, explores their long-distance love affair. Created originally by Laberge-Côté with two dancers in Mannheim, the piece has been reimagined as a duet for its Toronto incarnation.

Living apart for long periods seems to have ben-



efited their relationship. But what about spending countless hours together in the studio?

"I've laughed a lot, I've cried a lot, and it's been exhausting," Caldwell says. "But an exhausting creative process is the best sign you're creating something special." — $Chris\ Dupuis$

THE ANTI-SPA

"Screw relaxation." That's the mantra of The Ten Spot, which is not your everyday spa. There are no whale calls whispering from the speakers or dimly lit, silent rooms. The sleek, bright and friendly shop provides a lively atmosphere, with fun conversations, movies playing on flat screens, fridges stocked with iced tea and a healthy variety of magazines. Because let's face it, even gay men and women have a hard time finding anything worth reading in *Chatelaine*.

"We try and customize as much as we can," says Angie Cummings, social media manager and woman in charge at the Leslieville location. "We have TV in our waxing rooms, so if you like to watch *The Office* as you get waxed, we try and make that happen."

The Ten Spot has grown to six beauty bars across Toronto and one in Hamilton. The team members pride themselves on their attention to cleanliness, safety and quality, but it's really the laid-back vibe that sets this salon apart—and that attracts a male crowd.

"We have men come in to have body waxing done, but we also have quite a few guys for the gents' facial or nail services," Cummings says. "We're now seeing gay guys coming in as a group or a lot of men who are definitely being booked in by their wife."

The Ten Spot's menu includes a "gent grooming" section that focuses less on polish and more on scrubbing, exfoliation and cleaning (the Get Nailed foaming body buffer created in-house and made in Toronto does this quite nicely).



"This isn't such a hyper-feminine space that a man is going to feel uncomfortable," Cummings says. "We find that men like having a separate menu and seeing that services are tailored to them. They don't have to worry about potentially having a glossy polish put on their nails . . . unless, of course, they want it." — *Phil Villeneuve*

SHARRON MATTHEWS ISN'T AFRAID OF THE DARK

Cabaret sensation Sharron Matthews presents dark, sexy and honest stories in Full Dark: Part Deux, Earlier this year, Matthews became Buddies in Bad Times' firstever cabaret artist-in-residence as part of the theatre's artist-residency program. It promotes queer performance by providing "space and time in the theatre along with dramaturgical, technical, production and administrative support," Matthews says, noting this effectively means she has a "space to put on new stuff in front of people without the stress of solo producing."

She took full advantage of her new position in the March workshop Full Dark, which focused on serious, edgy stories (akin to Grimms' Fairy Tales) about topics such as bullying, dangerous sex and growing up fatherless. Matthews used a method she calls "songalogues": like monologues but told with the aid of music from artists like Florence and the Machine, Beyoncé and the Righteous Brothers.

Full Dark's material was only partially rehearsed, left somewhat raw so audiences could see firsthand how a performance becomes polished. Matthews presented one piece about what happens after death without knowing how it would finish, creating an ending onstage. She says she thought, "Oh my god, this is how it ends!" just before "the audience went wild!" The second installment of the show, Full Dark: Part Deux, employs the same methods but features all new material. Matthews provides an example of a piece she might do: "I think I'll do a dark, kinky version of Little Red Riding Hood that explores the premise 'What if she knew what she was going into the forest for?" - Jeremy Willard

Nobody can tell ya, There's only one song worth singing, They may try and sell va, 'Cause it hangs them up, To see someone like you, But you gotta make your own kind of music. Sing your own special song, Make your own kind of music, Even if nobody else sings along

Those perfectly inspiring words (from the 1969 pop classic sung by Mama Cass) still hold true for many 20-something art boys. In the last few years, with the help of Tumblr blogs, Facebook groups, YouTube, SoundCloud, workouts at the gym or just a fierce stance in six-inch heels, a few fellows have captured the hearts and imaginations of many but have yet to hit the mainstream. They're not going away anytime soon because you don't know them

A different breed of superstar, these gay boys are not packing auditoriums and rolling in dough. They're accumulating "likes" on Facebook, giving away their music, posing naked for photographer friends and selling their creations on Etsy. It's as if there are mini explosions, tiny little Warhol Factory-type environments, popping up in forever-queer havens like Los Angeles, New York and San Francisco. Boys moving back and forth through these cities with songs and art in their hearts and hard dicks in their brightly coloured American Apparel undies.

Most importantly, they have lots of talent to throw around.

I've had my Sissydude blog for al-

most five years and have seen (through trolling Tumblr, mostly) some of these boys evolve from photographers' muses to interesting artists.

I distinctly remember a few years back, when browsing through New York photographer Walt Cessna's extensive Tumblr archive, being totally smitten by two of the models, Rica Shay and Kyle Kupres.

Shay is a cute, thin boy with sad, lovely eyes and a very, very nice bum. He pops up here and there looking fresh and young with a jaunty baseball cap on his head. In the last few years, he's become quite the hip-hop performer. He has a lot of attitude but always with a friendly wink. His newest tune is called "Damn You Nasty," and it's his best to date. 
from New York to LA. How Patsy Gallant is that!

Ab Soto also inhabits a world all his own. It's a world full of colour and zany pattern mixing with zillions of popculture references so lovingly thrown your way it never hurts. Super-sexy Soto is always clad in gigantic T-shirts,


his eyebrows painted bright 1980s blue, the look topped off with a yellow construction-paper crown. What's not to love?

For a few art boys, jerking off on camera — or actually starring in major studio porn videos — is also an expression of who they are. Showing off your hairy asshole or getting gangbanged by a bunch of spray-tanned twinks is no longer something to be kept a secret. It's a celebration, an exploration, part of the journey. Like Madonna's Sex book, it's a total "Fuck yeah!" And it pays for art supplies.

There are also a few pornstars who are doing things a tad more quirky and artistic than most. Like the adorable and sexy Colby Keller and Dale Cooper.

These two pals defy the artsy-boy ethic and live in the city of Baltimore. Maybe John Waters's beloved home has rubbed off on them because they really are interesting creatures.

Cooper kills me. First off, on his website Dale Does Porn, he shares the smart writing he has done for *Huffington*

Post; his goofy, childlike drawings; and the origin of his tattoos (hint: Ultima IV: Quest of the Avatar). When he's on Randy Blue live chat he can be seen naked, knitting a scarf or munching on a cupcake that looks like a rosebud (the fisted kind). To me, it's more clever and revealing than anything Marina Abramović has ever done.

Okay, seriously ... the picture of him lying naked on his bed, erect dick in hand, reading Roland Barthes — I don't see Pierre Fitch or Cody Cummings doing that kinda shit.

Now Keller is a total sweetheart. He (with help from partner Karl Marxxx) has an awesome blog called Big Shoe Diaries where he shares his love of art, road-trip photos and his video readings of *Eight Days a Week*, a novel by Larry Duplechan (he's on chapter 63).

I had a chance to meet Keller when he visited Toronto during Pride. I'd call him a gentle giant, but I'm taller than him, so I don't think I can. He really does have a magic presence good vibes all around. So what did he do in our fair city, besides manning his spanking booth at Fit Primpin'? He went gallery hopping! How cute is that? He looked at art.

He also went to Hanlan's, where I did a total Sandra Dee/Gidget to his Big Kahuna and like a fool — in a vintage straw sun hat, no less — ran after him in the sand. "Colby, Colby," I yelled. I invited him to join a group of my drunken, MDMA-happy friends. My last artist harks back to the days of Cecil Beaton or, say, Guglielmo Plüschow. Felix d'Eon is such a beautiful painter. He lives in Mexico City and seems to have an endless parade of boys coming to visit his space, taking off their clothes and casually having sex so he can either photograph them for future paintings or paint them on the spot.

His subjects may be here and now, but in the paintings they turn into Boy Scouts, mermen, 1920s schoolboys, Thai princes, Victorian dandies or even World War One soldiers — soft, dreamy ink-and-watercolour works that are never twee. In a way they're just as explicit as Tom of Finland. His subjects embrace the world one kiss at a time, and breathtakingly so.

This is just a sample of the young art boys that I find the most out of the ordinary, the ones who have been on my radar for a few years now. I'll have to leave Big Dipper, Nicky Da B and the exotic perfection that is Lelf for another time. Check them out if you have a chance. I leave you with this from another Mama Cass ditty, called "Different":

I had the power that set me apart, I learnt to take it and use it to make it, It's not so bad to be different, To do your own thing and do it with heart, I'd rather be different than be the same.

Fuck yeah, Mama Cass!


