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

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

# The changing face of news

OST JOURNALISTS ARE insatiably curious skeptics who easily become bored. They're attracted to the craft, often, because every new story arc represents a new and stimulating adventure. One of the really great things about being a journalist today is that the job is changing so quickly. It's anything but boring.

Every once in a while, a story comes along that redefines the entire process of news reportage. Those stories are usually few and far between, but in the last year, Xtra has seen a handful.

One Sunday morning last August, as I was checking my news feeds, I learned that a gunman had attacked a gathering of gay teens in Tel Aviv, killing two and wounding many more. I happened at the time to have recently returned from that city's Pride celebration. While there, I had visited the place where the attack would shortly unfold. I had also recently familiarized myself with Twitter. Much more interesting than the BBC, AP and Al Jazeera accounts of the attack and subsequent protest vigil, were the footprints in the aftermath left on Twitter by the gay people living in Tel Aviv.

Along with heart-wrenching expressions of horror and grief, information about the gunman, who was hurt, who had died and what was going to happen next spread, one tweet at a time, from the moment the gunman fled. There was confusion and misinformation, early lack of clarity and knee-jerk expressions of irrational rage. There were also real-time accounts of gay people, groping for some action to take, moving en masse toward the scene. The work of the professional journalists covering the story for television simply couldn't compare to the richness of unfolding events as related, a few tiny characters at a than ever before, becoming active time, by those who were living it.

The next game changer was the story of Chris Skinner. Skinner, tentially very powerful evolution. you'll recall, was the gay man who, while walking home from a birth- Matt Mills is editorial director of day celebration in Toronto's entertainment district on the evening of Oct 18, was beaten to the ground by still-unidentified suspects who then crushed him to death under the wheels of their SUV.

The story is not unique for its horror. Toronto's gay communities are too familiar with tragedy and violence. What made this story journalistically unique was the role played by social media and the web. Skinner's story, as reported by Xtra, flashed within hours to gay people around the world. Rather than publishing whole new stories every few days, Xtra updated readers as each detail emerged. And the expressions of rage and grief on various social media were an overriding part of the tale. The story unfolded in real time before all our eyes, giving insight into police procedures and community activism, and acknowledging with every step which

questions remained unasked. But that was just the beginning. With a simple, single act, a few keystrokes spawned by an idea fleshed out in casual conversation among friends, two Toronto guys created a Facebook page calling for a candlelight vigil and march in Skinner's memory.

Within a few days, more than 1,000 people, many of them no more than familiar strangers, would gather at Church and Wellesley in one of the most beautiful demonstrations of solidarity I've ever had the privilege to be a part of.

This issue's Pride Toronto coverage is another one of those redefining stories. And, from a journalistic perspective, it's even more interesting. Our print coverage is informed almost completely by work that first appeared online at Xtra.ca. Not only did masses of people respond immediately to Xtra's report of Pride Toronto's new sign-vettingby-ethics-committee policy, not only did a Facebook group spring up that would go on to attract more than 1,500 cogent dissenters, but those invested in the story engaged in their own reportage. A flurry of meaningful and important questions and answers, formerly festering as idle gossip, have come roaring to the fore.

What does this say to me? That gay activists are using a whole new set of tools to effect positive change and that readers are, more participants in telling the stories of our lives. It's a wonderful and po-

#### **Uganda & Anglicans**

I'VE BEEN FOLLOWING THE criminalization of homosexuality in Uganda with deep concern ("Homophobia in the Pearl of Africa," March 11, *Xtra*). The only way we can help stop this happening is with international pressure.

We have tried through the Anglican communion, but the Anglican church in Uganda only contributes to homophobia. Archbishop Rowan Williams - the titular head of the Anglican communion, the Archbishop of Canterbury – appears to be afraid to further antagonize the Anglican Bishop of Uganda by speaking out against the criminalization campaign.

Integrity International and Other Sheep have been putting on pressure but to no avail. Even a recent meeting of the primates of the Anglican communion with the Episcopal church in the USA's presiding bishop in attendance failed to address Uganda.

A partnered lesbian was elected as a suffragan bishop in Los Angeles in December. There is supposed to be a moratorium on the election of gay and lesbian bishops as a result of the Windsor Report and the recent Lambeth conference. If her election is approved by the majority of American Episcopal bishops, the Archbishop of Canterbury will kick the Episcopal church in the USA out of the Anglican communion. One Episcopal church, Christ Church in Savannah, Georgia, has switched allegiance to the Bishop of Uganda.

So the church only contributes to misunderstanding.

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

## Anti-porn feminists battle lezzie sluts

"Anti-porn feminists battle lezzie sluts before top court," we reported, 10 years ago this spring. At the time, Little Sister's, a gay Vancouver bookstore, was making its case before the Supreme Court of Canada.

Little Sister's was the subject of ongoing harassment by Canada Customs (now the Canada Border Services Agency), with books regularly seized and shredded at the border.

The case was argued by Little Sister's, its lawyer, Joe Arvay, and interveners including Cynthia Petersen (pictured here at the Supreme Court in March of 2000) for Equality of Gays and Lesbians Everywhere, as Egale Canada was then known.

Little Sister's won, but its victory was bittersweet. Border guards continue to hold gay material, most recently three films destined for the Inside Out Film Festival.

The headline poked fun at Equality Now's Janine Benedet, who read a gay rape scene into the record during the case. Equality Now, US academic Catharine MacKinnon and others argued at the time that porn is sick and damaging - rather than a healthy, fun part of many people's sexual lives. PHOTO BY SHAWN SCALLEN

Mary Benson competed in the Vancouver 2010 Paralympic Games as an out lesbian cross-country skier. She placed 12th in the 1km sprint and 14th in the 5km classic. Ten years ago, a severe allergic reaction to anti-smoking meds left part of her brain injured, forcing her to learn how to walk and talk again. Benson credits her partner, Kathy, for getting her involved with skiing.

## Shameless sluts could be key to HIV-prevention work

"ISN'T IT TIME TO CRITICALLY ASSESS the reasons why gay men take sexual risks?

That's the key question for Francisco Ibáñez-Carrasco, program manager for the Ontario HIV Treatment Network.

"HIV organizations have been shamed into not thinking. They're told they're being funded to distribute condoms in the streets," he says.

Along with Peter Hall, a research coordinator at the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health and St Michael's Hospital, Ibáñez-Carrasco has conducted a meta-analysis of research studies on HIV prevention from Canada and other English-speaking countries.

The results paint a portrait of researchers who lump gay men with straight-identified men who have sex with men (MSM) and who may lead lives of fear and shame. However, they also discovered that some gav men, whom they call sex pigs, have ideas about sex that go against the grain of conventional prevention.

Ibáñez-Carrasco defines "sex pigs" as a fluid group of people, mostly but not always HIV-positive gay men, who may or may not describe themselves as sex pigs.

"Sex pigs would be the bungee jumpers of sexuality," he says. "It's people who are more experimental and take higher risks."

He points to drug use and the fetishization of bodily fluids as examples

**Andrea Zanin** of the risky behaviours sex pigs might be gravitated toward.

> He says there is no sociological literature or peer-reviewed work specifically focusing on this group. But the premise of this work is that it's nonetheless a group worth paying attention to.

> "Not to pathologize or create more stigma around them, but because they are repositories of social memory, sexual memory, and they have very important links in the community. We think of them as people we need to eradicate or control, but culturally, they're part of the fabric of society."

> Ibáñez-Carrasco and Hall tout an alternative: what if we placed HIV-positive gay men at the centre of prevention efforts, and affirmed (rather than condemned) their choices, even those of sex pigs?

> That approach, what they call "positive prevention" takes into account how positive guys make sexual choices. Those choices may include barebacking with other poz guys (serosorting) and choosing to top or bottom during unprotected sex based on an understanding of what's riskier in terms of transmission (seropositioning).

> "Positive prevention would not say to them, 'You must stop that,' although it's always a possibility, and there are techniques to modify your behaviour. But rather, it's to say, 'Under what conditions will you be doing this? What can we do to create the best environment for you to do that?""

> But poz guys aren't at the centre of HIV-prevention work at the moment,

says Ibáñez-Carrasco, for a whole host of reasons: the criminalization of the sexual behaviour of HIV-positive people; the "real apartheid between HIV-positive and HIV-negative" people; the lack of resources to help serodiscordant partners (sex partners who have different HIV statuses) make informed choices; the push toward monogamy and marriage as safeguards against HIV transmission; and the resistance to talking about the emotional allure of unprotected sexual practices.

"Epidemiology just says, 'They had unprotected sex,' and ends it at that, and this trickles down into public health policy. But we never ask, 'Why on earth do you do this; what is the meaning of this? Why do you want to connect or share loads?"

They're conducting a workshop will invite audience dialogue and explicitly aims to create controversy.

"It's clear that we don't have enough opportunities to talk about this, and certainly we don't have opportunities where sluts and pigs feel they can share their wisdom. Why? Because we don't think they have wisdom."

On the contrary, though, Ibáñez-Carrasco insists we can learn from sex pigs, and now is the time to do it.

"Sex pigs might be generational, and we don't want to have a whole generation die without us knowing."

#### Building audience first order of business

PINK TRIANGLE PRESS (PTP), THE company that publishes Xtra, in partnership with Peace Point Entertainment Group, has bought HardTV, a gay-porn digital specialty channel.

The channel was purchased from OutTV's parent company in a deal valued at about \$70,000.

Shavick Entertainment Group is the majority owner of OutTV, while PTP and Peace Point each hold a minority stake in that channel. Under the HardTV deal, Shavick gives up all interest in HardTV, while the rest of the ownership structure of OutTV remains unchanged.

Under the new ownership of HardTV, approved by the Canadian Radio Television and Telecommunications Commission in December, PTP secures a 55 percent controlling stake, with Peace Point holding the remaining 45 percent.

PTP is no stranger to gay sexual expression. In addition to the Xtra chain of newspapers, fab and Guide magazines and its share in OutTV, the not-for-profit company also operates hookup services Cruiseline and Squirt.org. As well as their partnership in OutTV, PTP and Peace Point also work together on Bump, the international gay travel show.

HardTV was spun out of OutTV (then called PrideVision) when the officer. "We've been putting a lot of work into OutTV, and it still needs a lot of work, but it's come a long way," says Chang. "There just weren't enough resources to also reposition and revitalize HardTV. We decided that we didn't want to lose a major media outlet for the community, so we decided to take

it over and do that ourselves." Since PrideVision was rebranded as OutTV. HardTV has languished.

"We thought once we invested in it we could make it into a successful business," says Les Tomlin, president and CEO at Peace Point. "It was kind of a wounded soldier that was lying there for three years, and now it's going to get the tender loving care that it needs."

Tomlin says some changes are already underway - to start, viewers should notice fewer reruns. Over the longer term, HardTV may expand beyond digital cable.

"We realize that people aren't just watching TV. You've got to be available on different platforms," especially online and on mobile devices, savs Tomlin. "We're going to look into ways to expand the brand into multiple platforms."

## Needle sharing is a 'reality' until feds start a clean-gear program

**LENITA SPARKS, 47, RECOUNTS THE** first time she used a needle, while serving a three-year sentence for fraud.

"The first time I ever shot drugs was at Kingston [Penitentiary for Women]," she says. "I shot speed. I used somebody's needle to shoot it. About 10 of us used the same needle."

Kate and Gordon (not their real names) became HIV positive while serving their respective sentences in federal institutions. Both are convinced they contracted HIV from dirty needles.

"I am 100 percent sure I got infected from sharing used needles," says Kate.

"There is no doubt in my mind that I was infected with HIV from using an infected needle," Gordon says.

Their stories, and others, paint a grim picture of the state of harm reduction in Canadian prisons. In early February, the Canadian HIV/AIDS Legal Network (CHANL) released Under the Skin, a candid report on drug use and needle sharing in prisons.

The report includes the personal testimonies of 50 former and current

inmates in Canada's correctional institutions.

Under the Skin was written by senior policy analyst for CHANL Sandra Ka Hon Chu, with help from fellow staff members and various HIV/AIDS organizations.

With drug use common in jails, the scarcity of syringes makes IV drug users more prone to needle sharing – a "principle factor" in higher rates of HIV and hepatitis C (HCV) in Canadian prisons. (HIV and HCV prevalence in prisons is "10 and 20 times the estimated prevalence in Canada," according to the report).

The authors of *Under the Skin* call for Prison Needle Syringe Programs (PNSPs), which would provide clean needles to IV drug users in prison.

The Correctional Service of Canada (CSC) has never implemented such a program in a Canadian correctional institution, citing their zero-tolerance policy on drugs in prison.

When asked to comment on the potential of PNSPs being implemented in Canadian prisons. Josée Bellemare, on behalf of Minister of Health Leona Aglukkaq, reiterated the Government's mandate of eliminating drugs in prison.

"Our government cares about

preventing people, especially our young people, from becoming drug addicts in the first place," she tells Xtra. "That's why we're putting drug dealers in jail: so that our children are safe."

Richard Elliot, executive director of CHANL, says clean-needle programs are "absolutely critical" in preventing the spread of HIV and HCV.

"They say it is not their policy to introduce these things, and that's not good enough," he urges. "They really need to justify why they are taking this position."

Jim Motherall, who spent a total of 32 years behind bars, agrees with Elliot's view. He says government arguments against PNSPs are "ridiculous" since drug use in prisons is simply a reality.


"We have large numbers of prisoners who suffer from addiction," he says. "They're going to get the drug into them anyway they have to."

In 2006, Canadian prison officials flirted with PNSPs. At their request, the Public Health Agency of Canada compiled a report on the effectiveness and potential risks of PNSPs, but the recommendations contained in Public Health's report were never implemented.

Corrections representatives declined to comment for this story.

# **FANTINO CRUSADE** CONTINUES

Media covers mega-sweeps, ignores what happens next

JULIAN FANTINO HAS STRUCK AGAIN. On March 10, in a massive press conference from OPP headquarters broadcast live on many local TV stations, the OPP commissioner, now in his fourth year as Ontario's top cop, sat amongst dozens of police brass to announce a province-wide kiddie porn bust.

It was "a massive, coordinated" police operation involving many police forces across the province and resulting in 122 charges against 35 men and teens.

The language echoed a similar Fantino-chaired OPP press conference 13 months earlier, when 31 men were arrested in what Fantino then called the "largest bust for child porn in Ontario history."

And it was very similar to the press conference of February 2008, when 22 men and one woman were charged with child porn offences. After three highprofile busts over the last two years, very few cases have actually gone to court. When they have, they have received scant media attention. It is the difference between individual cases heard in court and highly orchestrated, scripted, televised police press conferences after charging a large group. Why does the media cover these charges so prominently, naming names, without any analysis or follow-up?

Mark Bourrie, an Ottawa historian and an expert on media and censorship issues, says this is typical of the Fantino machine.

"Fantino is a tireless self-promoter," he says. "He always leaves the impression these charges involve sevenyear-old kids exploited by Mafialike porn-makers.

"Of course, no one in the media says, 'boo.' They don't want to be tagged as defenders of child molesters, and Fantino's version of reality makes for another great menace storyline."

Rob Teixeira, a doctoral student researching sexual regulation, agrees. "It's interesting that many [in the public] are taken in as soon as they read 'kiddie porn' in the press. Critical thinking is shut down, and the media report the police perspective almost exclusively.'

Fantino dramatically announced on March 10 - as he did a year earlier that he would "not rest" until he had "hunted down all the child predators"

out there. This personal pledge has been picked up by many TV stations and some newspapers as "news" several times over the years.

In the current bust, the accused men are mostly accused of internet childporn possession or distribution. Police call this charge "make available," but the police promotion machine sees no difference between creating kiddie porn and having it on your computer.

The men were from 16 cities across the province. All 35 were charged with what Fantino apocalyptically called 'one of the most heinous crimes that human beings can inflict on each other."

Curiously, charges of "sexual assault" appear in much of the press coverage but not in the OPP official list of charges to date. And pointedly, Fantino and the other police brass present gave no specific details of the alleged crimes, the ages or even the sexes of the "victims," or how the police became aware of those charged, or anything else upon which an independent analysis or assessment could be made. One has to take it on faith. as the mainstream media did, that the cops had broken up a huge kiddie porn operation and that the accused were all child abusers.

Surprisingly, most of the 32 formally charged were young people themselves. Nine are teenagers aged 15 to 19 (five are 17 or under); 10 are in their 20s (five of these between 21 and 23).

Just six of the men were 36 or older. This may be because the younger generation live much of their lives online, and many casually exchange photos all the time, Teixeira notes.

"Child porn offences can be incurred by anyone as easily as clicking on the wrong link. That is considered 'possessing.' Teens can be charged with these offences just for taking images of themselves and sending them to other teens. In that case, they can be charged with making, possessing and distributing. Teens are indeed being arrested under this law."

This has been Fantino's modus operandi since his days as the London, Ontario, police chief from 1991 to 1998. There he targeted gay men in "Project Guardian" for involvement in what he called - in highly publicized press conferences - a province-wide "kiddie porn ring." It was later shown to involve people

who mostly didn't know each other, teenaged hustlers and their older johns.

Only two were eventually convicted of pornography offences. But by 1994,

Fantino had persuaded the then-NDP provincial government to provide London police with funding for a provincewide police program attacking the perceived growing threat of kiddie porn rings. Richard Hudler, a longtime gay activist who closely watched Fantino's anti-child-porn crusade in the '90s, sees reason for hope this time around, as Fantino did not target any particular group - like gay men.

"I'm a little encouraged to see that they don't appear to be creating as much moral panic as previously. My hope is that the public is starting to realize that the hype attached to these massive numbers of charges is exaggerated." says Hudler.

Of course, Fantino isn't the only one in the OPP prone to overstatement. Fred Goldschmidt, the officer in charge of the special child porn section of the OPP, said that one computer seized had six million child porn images on it. This amazing number was particularly hard to believe - who would look at, let alone count, six million photos? And if they haven't looked at all the images, how can they tell they are porn, let alone child porn?

As the individual cases work their way through the courts, a more measured picture is likely to emerge. Following the last three mega-sweeps, there is usually no media exposure when charges are dropped, plea-bargained or prosecuted in the courts. And in the meantime, more than two dozen men have been named and shamed in their local newspapers.

#### Dyke Tory to keep up anthem battle

LESBIAN CONSERVATIVE Senator Nancy Ruth was in the Upper Chamber on March 3 while the Governor General read out the government's plans to make the national anthem gender neutral - one of Ruth's pet causes since being appointed in 2005.

"It was like, 'Yes!'" Ruth says.

The Prime Minister had agreed to look at the 1908 version, which had "Thou dost in us command," rather than "In all thy son's command."

The Senator's elation was short-lived. Just 48 hours later, the government said it was abandoning its proposal.

Cabinet ministers were mum when it came to promoting the issue, including Helena Guergis, minister of state for the status of women.

"I actually hold some of the media responsible," says Buth "They didn't once focus on the gender inclusiveness. I was pretty angry at the CBC and other places in the media."

Ruth plans to continue to push the issue, and says she has heard that Liberal MP Carolyn Bennett is planning to move for revised English and French versions of the anthem. –Dale Smith

#### Gaybasher's wrist slapped

THE EARLY MARCH SENTENCE for a London, Ontario, anti-gay attack wasn't tough enough, say anti-homophobia activists and one of the men who was assaulted.

On Sept 27, 2009, Erik Rozenski and his boyfriend were holding hands as they walked home after a night out at the local gay bar. They were attacked by two men who uttered homophobic slurs. Rozenski and his partner suffered scrapes and bruises.

Michael Gordon, 23, of Richmond Hill pleaded guilty and was given a suspended sentence with two years probation. The other suspect was never identified.

In a note posted on Facebook, Rozenski suggested Gordon should have received jail time.

"After all the hard work many people do to stop hate crimes in our community, the judicial system just comes along and wipes us off the board like a big inconvenience," he wrote. "Once again, the judicial system fails at bringing justice."

The Crown Attorney asked for 60 days in jail on top of probation, but the judge opted for a lighter sentence, reported the *London Free Press*.

# Shaira Holman wants to raise money for marginalized queers

"I AM MAD WITH GRIEF," SAYS Shaira Holman, who lost her partner, Catherine White Holman, in a plane crash last November off Saturna Island. "I am in so much pain, so much grief; I don't know what to do with myself. People in that much grief go on walks and pilgrimages, that's what I am going to do. I just need to put one foot in front of the other."

Departing from Vancouver on April 1, Holman plans to walk more than 100 days across Canada to arrive in Toronto in time for Pride on July 4. She's calling it the Walk for Love.

"It gives me an alternative to suicide," she says. "I don't want to be here without Catherine. We had the biggest love of anyone I've known."

"I don't even like walking," Holman says, "so I think it will be quite an ordeal, penance maybe. I have a lot of guilt, survivor guilt. We had planned on going to the island together. If I had gone, we would have been on the ferry and she wouldn't have died. It's hard to forgive myself for that. Maybe I can let some of the pain go in the wilderness somewhere."

The 4,000-kilometre journey will be a fundraiser for the Catherine White Holman Memorial Legacy Fund for queers living in poverty.

"I wanted a way to continue Catherine's work for marginalized people," Holman explains.

A well-respected counsellor and a founding member of Vancouver's Three Bridges clinic, Catherine wrote the Guidelines for Transgender Care and Care for Transgender Adolescents, considered the benchmarks on best practices internationally. She also helped launch queer health programs

cess to funding and resources.

simple application process, Holman promises. "The application for disability is 26 pages. Catherine helped people fill it out and get the money they needed. This fund will continue that work. It's about need; people can use it for education or to help them get out of poverty, whatever they need."

Holman has started the fund by providing \$3,000 seed money and hopes to raise at least \$200,000.

Departing on April Fool's Day because she is a self-professed "fool for love," Holman says she'll be depending on the kindness of strangers along her journey. "Most people who go across the country have a support team, an RV that follows them, etc. I'm hoping that there will be a network of people along the way who can feed me, shelter me, carry my pack and, of course, donate to the fund."

"I am taking my dog Tilda with me," Holman says. "I don't have a sponsor, but Tilda does. Sophie's Pet Palace will be providing for her needs."

"It's also kind of an art project," adds Holman, who is the artistic director of the Pride in Art Society. "I will have GPS with me so people can track my journey and join in anywhere along the way. I will be walking every day and writing every night."

"I can't make sense of this thing that has happened," she says. "Catherine was my light and my light has gone out. This is me trying to find that light again."

"Her body is not here, but I feel her all the time. I know she will be with me on this journey. She'll be saying, 'Honey, you don't like walking. You're from LA; you drive everywhere.' But she'll also say 'You're my hero,' because that's what she told me all the time."

# Hate speech repeal falls off spring agenda

#### THE COMMONS JUSTICE COMMITTEE

FEDERAL POLITICS

started a study on Section 13 of the Canadian Human Rights Act (CHRA) in the previous session of Parliament, but the government's decision to prorogue killed the committee — and the study.

Now that the Hill's justice committee has resumed, is the study going to come back?

Not necessarily.

"We had a meeting of the steering committee," says Liberal justice critic Dominic LeBlanc. "This didn't come up." Section 13 of the CHRA governs

the transmission of hate speech by telephone or on the internet.

Some, including U of T law professor Brenda Cossman, have called for the section to be repealed. She argues that Section 13 establishes a lower threshold for offences than the two hate speech laws that appear in the Criminal Code.

"We'd sort of begun to scratch the surface [of the study]," says Conservative MP Brent Rathgeber, a proponent of repealing Section 13. "We'd had two or three days of hearings and heard from the human rights commissioner, and of course from Ezra [Levant] and Mark Steyn."

The NDP's justice critic, Joe Comartin, nevertheless says he has his doubts that the government wants to pursue the study. And while Comartin says he has heard that Conservatives on the committee want to resume the study, they appear to be giving it no priority.

"Given the backlog of bills and other work, studies that we're doing on organized crime, I have a hard time, quite frankly, seeing us doing anything more on that at least in this year, and I expect an election sometime this year, so I think it probably is not going to go anyplace."

LeBlanc says he sees the utility of the study, but isn't anxious to make it a priority.

"If the government decides to let it go, that certainly would be fine with us," LeBlanc says.

#### Kenney dodges, again


IMMIGRATION MINISTER JASON Kenney dodged more questions on March 16 about the removal of gay issues from the Canadian citizenship study guide.

At a Commons immigration committee meeting, NDP MP Olivia Chow asked Kenney if gay rights would be added to the next printing. Kenney would not commit, turning instead to his talking points: there was "zero content" on gay issues or same-sex marriage in the 1995 edition of the guide, and the new edition includes a reference to Mark Tewksbury. Of course, the 1995 guide couldn't have referenced gay marriage, which wasn't legalized until 2005.

On March 2, Canadian Press reported that Kenney's office deliberately removed gay references from an early draft of the guide. Kenney's office has not returned *Xtra*'s calls.

# THE SOUND OF THE **UIRTOUTS** Queer protest wrings concession from Pride Toronto over censorship policy F

PRIDE TORONTO HAS RESCINDED its sign-vetting policy, ending a difficult two weeks for the organization.

Responding to community outrage, largely voiced on Facebook and Twitter, Pride Toronto issued an open letter on March 23:

"The Board of Directors of Pride Toronto has listened to feedback from the community, and the proposed plan for an ethics committee to review and approve all messaging prior to the parade, Dyke and Trans March has been withdrawn. The process followed during the 2009 festival will remain in place for 2010."

That statement ends one chapter in a very public spat. But many of the issues that made the sign controversy such a flashpoint - free expression, Middle Eastern politics, the role of small-c and capital-C conservatives in the gay movement,

**Marcus McCann** and the increasing prominence of corporate sponsors at the parade - remain.

It all started two weeks earlier, on March 10, when Pride Toronto re-

leased a short, cheerful-sounding announcement.

Everyone marching in the Pride Parade would be asked to "ensure that messages support the theme of the 2010 festival," according to a press release published to its website.

Despite the tone, there was an edge to the release.

"Participating groups must agree... to have their messages and signage approved by the ethics committee of Pride Toronto in advance of the event. Groups who fail to cooperate with the new practices will be denied permission to take part or removed from the line-up if necessary."

Pride Toronto co-chair Jim Cullen was quoted as saying the policy was a way of "promoting freedom of expression and diversity.'

Social media exploded. Tweeters turned snarky, and a protest page on Facebook quickly shot up to more than 1,000 members. Members of Queers Against Israeli Apartheid (QuAIA) said the policy appeared to be aimed at them.

For most queers who posted their concerns on Xtra.ca, Facebook and Twitter, their anger had little to do with QuAIA or

any other specific group. The issue was censorship.

And those concerns were exacerbated by the slick doublespeak of the announcement, according to writer David Demchuk and others who gathered online.

It wasn't long before all the sunshine had drained out of Pride's communications.

Cullen gave a clenched-jaw interview for Xtra online, in which he insisted the new policy had nothing to do with QuAIA

Tracey Sandilands, Pride Toronto's executive director, tried to rebuff a Facebook group by telling members that "lies and misinformation" were being spread about her organization. Her post sparked more ridicule than reconciliation.

The following week, Sandilands was more upbeat, promising that Pride would circulate a detailed freedom-of-expression policy before adopting it.

But by then, anti-censorship queers had set up a letter-writing campaign, and queers were venting their (sometimes tangentially) related concerns about Pride at several internet hubs. Some members of the Facebook group began tracing the policy back to focus groups run over the winter by conservative PR firm Navigator (see sidebar).

At the same time, Toronto's queer

literati took up the cause, including novelist Zoe Whittall, poet RM Vaughan and playwright Brad Fraser.

The stakes were raised again when both queers in favour and opposed to the sign-vetting rule began emailing their protest directly to Pride Toronto's sponsors.

Calls for further action — including boycotting the Pride Parade and staging an alternative Pride a week earlier reached a fevered pitch in the days before Pride Toronto's reversal.

Questions remain about how political signs at the parade will be handled, since the Parade Terms and Conditions still contain a lengthy clause about messaging. While signs will not be vetted in advance, folks with controversial signs can still be ejected on the day of the parade.

Calls to Genevieve D'Iorio and Jim Cullen, the co-chairs of Pride Toronto were not returned by press time. Executive director Tracey Sandilands, when reached at her office, directed inquiries to the board.

"It's the board that's driving the policy," she told Xtra on March 23. "I'm not sure if it'll make everyone happy, or if people will think it's too little too late."

### **Sandilands** defends sign policy

#### Xtra spoke with Pride Toronto executive director Tracey Sandilands on March 16.

We knew nobody was going to be happy with the decision, but unfortunately, we are not going to be banning anyone. But we are tightening up on the messaging simply because we can't afford to have in the parade things like on the March 11 cover of Xtra, "Sodomy equals death." We can't afford on the day to let somebody who may be a volunteer and not necessarily be knowledgeable about whether something is allowed or not. The idea is simply to ensure that we have measures in place to deal with what may come up. The idea is not to sanitize Pride. I realize that people are getting hot under the collar about the issue before they have all the facts. We are looking at a strategy for clarifying a few things.

# Anatomy of a movement

Xtra published Cate Simpson's story on Pride's new sign-vetting policy on March 11. That same day Rick Telfer registered the Don't Sanitize Pride Facebook group. Since then membership in it has swelled to more than 1,500 members, and Pride Toronto has changed its course. Telfer spoke with Xtra's Matt Mills on March 23. Here's what he said:

Pride's change of heart reflects a reaction from the wider community. It was such an outcry and outpouring of concern about the new policy, it was clear the board of directors needed to assume its proper role and get back in the driver's seat.

My sense is that the board may not have been entirely involved in the policy development process and once they realized they were asleep at the wheel, they risked losing legitimacy. I think it's a really good sign and it shows that a little online activism can have an impact in a fairly significant way.

I started the Facebook group simply because I learned about this new censorship policy. As we moved ahead, a whole range of other issues came to the fore, including deep community concern about the increasing corporatization of Pride, and the community's democratic involvement in setting the direction for Pride celebrations.

It's literally a case where people need to break down into committees and talk about who's going to tackle which issue and then start working it.

I don't think the overarching goal should be to get anybody. It's not about cutting throats; it's about peering into the organization that runs our Pride and figuring out if it serves the interests of the community, or if it is serving the interests of individuals within the community. Some of it will happen through online activism, but online activism can only go so far. When you want to actually figure out an organization, you have to actually get involved with it on a personal level.

# **WERE THE FOCUS GROUPS STACKED?**

## Political messaging was one of the main topics: participant

Focus groups conducted by conservative PR firm Navigator discussed censoring parade participants less than two months before Pride Toronto's botched signage announcement.

Focus group participant Cathy Gulkin charges that the focus groups were "stacked" and "not representative of the community." She says four of the 10 women in her pool were there to call for the censorship of signs about political, non-queer issues and denounced Queers Against Israeli Apartheid (QuAIA)'s participation in the 2009 parade.

Although she says she's not a member of QuAIA, Gulkin marched with the group in 2009.

However, her assertion is bolstered by two similar versions of an email obtained by Xtra that suggest there was an effort to fill the groups with people who want QuAIA banned from the parade.

One version of the email appears to be from Toronto lawyer Martin Gladstone, but Gladstone wrote to Xtra to clarify that he didn't draft the letter.

"I never wrote or composed a letter of any nature asking people to attend," he wrote. "There was one email in circulation that encouraged people to participate, which I forwarded to two people, and that was it. So this idea that I stacked and distorted the focus groups has no factual basis."

The emails ask that those who are accepted for the groups get in touch with Carol Pasternak. Pasternak did not respond to *Xtra*'s requests for comment.

Focus groups are one way to find out how people from a group feel about a given topic. They rely on the idea that a part can stand in for the whole. However, if the sample is skewed, it casts a shadow over the results.

Gulkin says she attended a Navigatorled focus group of lesbians over the age of 35 on Jan 26.

She says it was a group of four participants, not moderator Chad Rogers of Navigator, who introduced the subject of political, non-queer messaging and QuAIA.

"It was introduced by one of the members of the focus group, who said, 'Let's talk about the elephant in the room." She says the group spent half of the

two-hour discussion talking about political messages and QuAIA.

Pride Toronto, not Navigator, chose the participants of the focus groups, says Navigator's Chad Craig. Although researchers would normally control the sample group, Pride Toronto conducted that part of the research to save money. Gulkin, meanwhile, says the results

should be considered "null and void." Pride Toronto's Tracey Sandilands

told Xtra she thought the focus groups had "a good mix" of people. "There were a few people that we

were able to identify when they applied that were specifically, were particularly, trying to stack the focus group on that particular issue, and we declined them to participate," she says. "So, if the focus groups were stacked, it was done without any knowledge of ours."

#### **FEBRUARY 11, 2010**

PT announces changes to the grand marshal selection process. Final selections will be made by a jury of peers, instead of a public voting process. "We are revisiting a number of our processes to see how we can better advance our mission and vision," says Sandilands.

#### **MARCH 10, 2010** PT issues a press release about terms

and conditions for participation in the parade. It reads in part, "Participating groups must agree to... have their messages and signage approved by the ethics committee of Pride Toronto in advance of the event. Groups who fail to cooperate with the new practices will be denied permission to take part or removed from the lineup if

necessary."

Xtra anonymously receives copies of two emails. The first, dated March 10, from the Simon Wiesenthal Center to Sandilands, offers to help

promote Pride in return for a "clearer statement on Pride's position on QuAIA." The second, from conservative PR firm Navigator, advises PT to hold steady in spite of the backlash. It reads in part, "Pride's decisions were not made based on any particular group or term, and we will not prejudge applications. Period."

#### **MARCH 16, 2010**

Sandilands tells Xtra that Pride staffers were aware there was a move afoot to influence the January focus groups, and that the organization moved to keep those people out.

#### **MARCH 17, 2010**

Cathy Gulkin tells Xtra that she participated in a Jan 26 Pride focus group that was "clearly stacked."

#### **MARCH 23, 2010**

PT announces it will drop its policy of vetting signs in advance of the parade. However, a detailed messaging policy remains on the books, meaning offensive signs could still be turfed on the day of the parade.

# SEXUAL POLITICS **A PIONEER IN PORN**

## Tristan Taormino navigates the back passages of sexual expression

INTHE PROCESS OF TRYING TO CREATE sex-positive, empowering porn for women, award-winning sex educator, columnist and feminist pornographer Tristan Taormino says she's learned a lot about what makes porn actors tick.

"For many of them, no matter how much they love their jobs, it's still a job," she says. "They're entitled to show up and have a good experience while they're getting paid."

Ten years after falling into the adult film business, Taormino has carved a successful career producing what she calls "organic, fair-trade porn" through her company, Smart Ass Productions.

Her movies have earned critical acclaim for challenging contrived stereotypes in what is admittedly a boys' club, putting women in charge of their sexual encounters both on- and offcamera.

"For me, feminist porn is all about having a filmmaking process that is intentional, ethical and responsible and creates a really good work environment," says Taormino, who is nominated in four categories at this year's Feminist Porn Awards (see story, page 23). "It's about respect and choice."

Starting off as a sex educator and 'anal sexpert," Taormino had a breakout hit with her book The Ultimate Guide to Anal Sex for Women.

Buoyed by the success, she went looking for a studio to produce an allfemale video adaptation of The Ultimate Guide that was part step-by-step guide, part "feminist gang-bang."

"I wanted to prove that the girl next door can enjoy anal sex," she explains. Mainstream studios were skeptical about an educational anal-pleasure video for women, but John Stagliano, aka Buttman, who was then a successful porn producer with a line of female ass-worship videos, saw the appeal.

Stagliano is one of the pioneers of "gonzo porn," a genre characterized by short, mostly unscripted clips with a camera-as-observer point of view. He agreed to finance The Ultimate Guide as a gonzo shoot with Taormino as director.

Taormino appeared in the final scene of the movie, in which the dozen female cast members test out what they've learned on her.

"I got fucked by who I wanted, how I wanted, with all the toys that I wanted," recalls Taormino, who abhors labels but will settle for being called queer, or an "equal opportunity lover."

The idea of portraying real choice and real arousal is reflected in her filmmaking, which is gonzo in form but captures both the sex and the motivations of the people involved.

In her Chemistry movie series, Taormino draws on a certain reality TV show to set the scene: take seven pornstars, put them in a house together for 36 hours, interview them, let them have sex any way they want, and have them film the result.

The couples, who have specifically selected their co-stars, are allowed to talk to each other and laugh. They choose how the sex progresses and for how long, which keeps the action fresh and avoids a common problem in gonzo.

"You don't have to worry about cumming. You just let them fuck how they want to fuck and they'll cum. That's just true," Taormino claims.

You also occasionally get some deep insights from actors who are presumed not to think very hard about what they do or why. In Chemistry Volume I, Mr Marcus, a black porn actor specializing in interracial scenes, rants about discrimination in the business while receiving a blowjob from co-star Dana DeArmond. A strap-on dildo session with Kurt Lockwood on the receiving end leads to a conversation about the gay-straight divide in porn.

Taormino tried a similar approach chronicling more aggressive malefemale sexual encounters in her latest series, Rough Sex. Stars like Sasha Grey are shown discussing their choice of co-star, the setting and what kinds of punishment they would like to endure, including (consensual) rape fantasies. and then act out the scene.

Though Taormino has raised eyebrows with her approach - "It's a bit of a touchy subject, whether male-dominated sex can be feminist," she admits - female viewers embrace the concept because "consent is very clear, desire is very clear, and who's in control is very clear.'

When she's not exploring the boundaries of feminist porn, Taormino maintains a hectic seminar schedule on the US university circuit and in the media, discussing everything from the sorry state of American sex education to polyamory. A proponent of open relationships, she penned the popular non-monogamy manual Opening Up in 2008 and appeared as an orgy "sextra" in John Cameron Mitchell's film Shortbus.

She occasionally strays north of the border to teach at Come As You Are and Northbound Leather, where her classes cover decidedly more difficult topics, like advanced anal play.







# BACKSTAGE HEMANBEHIND CURTAIN



As Buddies in Bad Times Theatre faces economic and creative challenges, much of the company's future rests on the shoulders of its new artistic director, Brendan Healy. What does he have in store?

Today, Brendan Healy is the artistic director of Toronto's Buddies in Bad Times Theatre. He's only the fourth to hold that position in the company's 31-year history, and he's the youngest. That's a description that makes him just a little uncharacteristically grumpy. "I'm fucking 34," he says. "I'm not young. I know what I'm doing; I have life experience. I'm not some kid." # **PORN** THE BEST IN **FEMINIST PORN**

### Adult pleasure that doesn't offend while you're getting off

FOR THE UNINITIATED, FEMINIST porn is an oxymoron, but for those who've attended the Good for Her Feminist Porn Awards (FPA), it's a relief.

The idea behind it is that porn shouldn't make you wince while you jerk it, and the porn industry should offer adult pleasure that doesn't offend while you're trying to get off.

"The Feminist Porn Awards create a unique, welcoming, sex-positive space that recognizes straight and queer representations of sex and sexuality in a very public and proud way," says Alison Lee, manager of Good for Her and FPA organizer.

"It's an event that brings a really fun and lighthearted side to porn," says Dylan Ryan, a Toronto performer who won the 2009 FPA Heartthrob of the Year. "Because there's so much taboo and stigma, people have a very isolated experience in relation to porn. The Awards don't take themselves too seriously, and they are the only venue that discusses and promotes feminist porn. Sometimes porn can be intimidating, and there's nothing intimidating about the Awards at all."

Unique to North America, the Awards were created to inspire, recognize and serve the ongoing demand for porn with feminist sensibilities. This is the fifth year for the FPA, and there are 54 nominations, including movies from Great Britain, Spain, the Netherlands, France, Sweden, Australia, New Zealand and the United States.

The Awards - with VIP party, featuring burlesque and, of course, lots of performers and directors - are Friday, April 9 at Berkeley Church.

"I heard some kinky awesome things happened last year after the show," says Dylan, "and there will definitely be some good afterparties this year, as well. People should come and check it out."

The festivities get going the night before with Provocative, Public Porn: The Year's Best in Feminist Film. The

event comprises a smutty screening followed by a roundtable discussion with various directors and performers, moderated by well-known Toronto burlesque performer CoCo La Crème.

Scheduled for the discussion are April Flores, a feminist pornstar who has had her body cast for the first plus-size sex toy; Shine Louise Houston, who directed industry favourite Crash Pad and remains one of the only queer, women of colour porn directors with a distribution deal; Nica Noelle, creator of Sweetheart Video and Sweet Sinner Films with Jon Blitt of Mile High Media; and Tristan Taormino, a porn director who has written six books on sexuality and has her own adult film production company, Smart Ass Productions.

"It's a great opportunity to scope out a bunch of hot pornstars and porn directors," says Lee, "and to see the very best of the best in steamy feminist porn that's come out in the past year."

either, with his mildly caffeinated masculinity, his crisply ironed shirts and his conservative ties. Don't let those externals fool you, though. He's as queer as they come.

I'm in the main space at Buddies, watching him rehearse Breakfast, which opened March 19. It's a remounting of a collectively devised show that scored three Dora nominations when it played at the Theatre Centre two years ago. He directed it then and is tackling it again with the same cast, though he says they have collaborated to produce a new and stronger ending. There are some 11 people milling around, but there are only three actors, all women (the others are techies - it's a tech-heavy show). The comfort level among them, and with him, is very high. There is much light-hearted banter about the repeated request "to set a sound level for the orgasm," which sends one actor into several extended - and convincing - sighs-and-moans arias.

He's not a director with a reputation for tantrums or incivility. If Healy wants some adjustment on the set or lighting, he's likely to phrase the request as, "I don't know how you'd feel about..." Performer Nina Arsenault, whom he directed in The Silicone Diaries, describes his technique as "generous, empathetic, supportive and smart. If we ever had disagreements, I had so much trust in him that we could just talk it out. It was so clear that he is committed to his love of performance with all of his being." Daniel Brooks, artistic director at Necessary Angel, met Healy when the latter was a student at the National Theatre School in Montreal and remembers him as a "bit of a control freak who can get very emotional if he feels things are slipping out of his control, but directors are often like that. He is also an incredibly sensitive and personable artist with an attraction to the real human process that theatre is. He gets very alive, human performances from his actors and dictators don't get that."

Performance helped lift him out of the gawkiness and insecurities of his childhood. In his early teen years, he got involved with an inner-city youth project in Montreal. The city had turned over an abandoned hangar to a bunch of kids and encouraged them to create, direct and perform new plays, and it was there, he says, "that I came into my own. I'd been lonely and isolated, and this gave me a way to connect with others. I came out, got laid, got drunk and started smoking." (He has yet to quit, and periodically takes a cigarette break during rehearsal.) He had his first sexual experience at 14, with a girl. He has had other sexual experiences with women and says his greatest love (of the non-sexual variety) was a woman, who came out at the same time he did, was his muse, and is currently "a very lean, very muscular, very queer performance artist who lives in Los Angeles." Still, he prefers men, sexually and romantically, and loves "the companionship of men. I like being around men. I like their masculine energy." (He is currently in a long-term relationship with Gregory Prest, an actor with Soulpepper). He's queer enough not to shut any doors, and though he's never had sex with a trans person, he enjoyed the almost stereotypical male/female dynamics that informed his collaboration with Nina Arsenault.

"For the first time in a long time," he says, "I allowed myself to feel really attracted to a woman. I like feminine women, and she really embodies that — lighting her cigarette and opening doors for her, those man/woman rituals. She's very good at making you feel like a man. I can get into those gender roles. They're fun, and playful. I don't war against them."

Though he studied directing at the National Theatre School, he began his career as an actor, most memorably playing the kind of queer little boy he once was in a drama called *Girls! Girls! Girls!* He describes himself as an actor of limited range, but he found that role particularly challenging.

"They wanted me to be really faggy. I'd straightened myself out when I was 12 or 13, become kind of uber-masculine and athletic. I got a kick out of people thinking I was straight. Suddenly, I had to deal with my own internalized homophobia, and that was hard for me." It did help him realize, though, that he was a much better director than he was an actor, an awareness fortified by his experience interning in Manhattan under the legendary Richard Maxwell, of the New York City Players. PHOTOS BY DAVID HAWE "He had a huge impact on me," Healy says, "through the uniqueness of his voice and the purity of his pursuit as an artist. It was really inspiring. He's an auteur, and I gravitate towards auteurs, people who are on some kind of investigation larger than the work. I like to think that what motivates me as a creator is more than just getting the show up, that I'm asking questions about existence, about life, about theatre and performance, about what theatre means, about why it's important to society."

Asking those sorts of questions in a queer context is part of his mandate at Buddies, where queer is defined as considerably more than gay, lesbian, bi and trans. According to the company's official mandate, it includes "work that is different, outside the mainstream, challenging in both content and form." Healy, who cites influences ranging from Foucault ("his History of Sexuality rocked my world") to Derek Jarman and Jean Genet, has an articulate take on what he calls the three fundamental queer values: a true celebration of difference, a rejection of assimilationism, and a rejection of essentialism.

"We say people are different from one another, and that's okay and it's important. It keeps society rich and open and dynamic. We reject assimilation — being accepted doesn't mean fitting into the status quo. It's the status quo that should adapt itself to difference. We reject essentialism because, though queers celebrate difference, it doesn't mean that we can't get along. Maybe your difference will rub off on me, and make me a little more different, like you."

If that all sounds crazy hopeful and pie in the sky, that's because Healy also believes queers are utopian.

"We believe," he says, "that one day homophobia, sexism and racism will disappear. That the queer liberation movement is also about liberating straight people. Queers are happy, self-actualized individuals, and we look at straight society and we see really contrived relationships and pre-determined modes of behaviour. We're all about liberating you. We're all queers. It's just that some of us are more open."

That's unashamedly 1970s-era gay lib talk, and it's good to hear it from someone who wasn't even born then. He'll need that passion and all his smarts, energies and enthusiasms to cope with the challenges facing theatre in general and queer theatre in particular. Buddies has experienced bad times of late. Audiences get smaller. People are busier. There are more forms of entertainment than ever. Healy is pleased that Buddies has the youngest audience base in the city, but that won't mean dumbing down, or less risk-taking. He wants to work with young creators who are interested in a collectivist approach (as unfashionable as that might be in an ego-fixated, celebrity obsessed world). He wants to produce content-driven work. "I want meaning," he says. "We have to go back to ideas."

A tall order. It's good to know it's in the hands of a one-time more or less fuckedup little kid with blue fingernails and a crazy fantasy life, a kid who grew up but never quite lost that queer edge. Just right for Buddies in Bad Times.

Hat Life magazine picks Toronto's David Dunkley as 2010 Hatty Award recipient

TORONTO DESIGNER DAVID DUNKLEY joined the ranks of the international hat-making elite this year when he received the prestigious Hatty Award from Hat Life magazine.

Dunkley, who launched KC's Hats six years ago, says he got into the hat-making business "by accident." He opened his shop, Studio 998, on Bathurst St two years ago and now works full-time as a milliner – that's a hat-maker, for the uninitiated.

"This is my third career and my most favourite," Dunkley says. "I was working at a job I was unhappy with, and my partner signed us up for a hat-making class the school board offered at night, just down the street at Central Tech."

That class sparked something in Dunkley, and he hasn't stopped making hats since.

"I was a scientist. I'd never designed before," he says. "Because my background is not art, I had to mature and grow as an artist."

Part of that growth has included learning with the luminaries of the field. He's studied with theatrical milliner Barbara Hobbs and is off to England soon to study under former royal milliner Rose Cory, who designed hats for the Queen Mother.

Dunkley's classically handmade headwear runs the gamut - top hats,

**Rob Salerno** bridal veils, headbands – and he works with everything from felt to furs, silver wire, beads, feathers and more. "I love feathers," he says. "They're

my favourite embellishment." Since opening his studio, his work

has been featured in national magazines and at Toronto Fashion Week and Fashion Cares. He recently designed a hat for Cheryl Tiegs to wear at Hats On for Awareness, the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health's gala fundraiser.

But hats aren't just for fashionistas and hipsters, and there's no such thing as a head that's not suited for hats, Dunkley says.

"Hats are like great clothes. If the proportion and size are correct, they'll look great," he says. "The colours and embellishments have to match the face, and you have to be comfortable having a crown on vour head."

Dunkley is one of just 30 milliners around the world to receive a Hatty, which Hat Life publisher Denise Keller says "serve[s] to intensify the spotlight on the headwear industry in a manner that not only honours individual contributions, but draws international attention to the exciting developments occurring in this extremely dynamic fashion segment."

# **THE LIFE AND WORK OF PETER FLINSCH**

#### Holocaust survivor, artist and lover of the male form

PETER FLINSCH WAS BORN IN LEIPZIG, Germany, in 1920. He grew up surrounded by his family's collection of Dutch Masters and Italian Renaissance masterworks. He travelled frequently as a child, receiving a classical education at prestigious private boarding schools. But after the collapse of the Weimar Republic and the Nazi seizure of power in 1933, he was forced into the Hitler Youth and then into the anti-aircraft division of the Luftwaffe.

In 1942, he was arrested for kissing a boy at a Luftwaffe Christmas party. He was court-martialled and imprisoned for violating Paragraph 175, Germany's anti-gay law.

After the war, Flinsch briefly returned to Leipzig and took a job painting official portraits for the local branch of the Communist Party. He honed his craft as a visual artist, creating state-approved images of party luminaries like Marx and Lenin.

He eventually immigrated to Montreal, which is where I visited him in Janusince 1968, and it's a fantastic museum.

Alistair Newton Photos of some of his favourite models – gorgeous naked men – gaze from the walls. Scrapbooks sit on low shelves. Peter's home studio is stacked nearly to the rafters with canvases and framed works; bursting sketchbooks sit on the worktable - truly a testament to a prolific working artist.

Peter, now 89, marched at the Nuremberg Rally, met Hitler twice, threw a party for Jean Cocteau, co-founded the Vancouver Ballet and experienced the birth of Montreal's gay community. He has been a theatre designer, visual artist and proud witness to gay history in the 20th century.

#### **ALISTAIR NEWTON: Were exhibitions** of your work ever shut down because they were considered obscene?

PETER FLINSCH: Oh yes, sure, that happens, but I don't care. I don't mind. When somebody buys a piece of my work, I know there's no censorship. They like it, you know. Money talks. AN: When you gained some fame for your work, did you use that opportunity to talk about gay rights?

# ANA PAULA HEADS FOR TO

## Smouldering DJ to set Canada's circuit crowd alight

**FRESH FROM MIAMI'S WINTER** Beach Party, DJ and Brazilian beauty Ana Paula is putting finishing touches on a new album, her first under the Star 69 Records label. The project emerged out of an invitation from dance music legend Peter Rauhofer.

Paula is gaining popularity quickly. Her busy schedule regularly takes her around the world. As *Xtra* catches up with her by phone, she's rushing from airport to gig, with style and a smile. She's on her way from her home in Rio to Sao Paulo for a set at Flexx Nightclub, before heading back to Rio for another set the next day.

"I want to see happy people," she says. "That is how I know I have done a good job. I love to play with the crowd.... When I play, I want to bring love, music, good energy and happiness to the dancefloor."

Paula started spinning on Rio's Jovem Pan Radio, where she quickly attracted attention. That gig led to numerous invitations to spin in some of the largest clubs in a city known for

its parties. Not just a DJ, Ana gained a reputation as a producer, too.


"Good DJs and good producers need to believe in themselves," she says. "They both need inspiration and need to have a connection with the people."

Coming in under the gay party radar, she was resident DJ at X-Demente (Rio) from 2003 to 2007, a gig Paula refers to as a "watershed event in Brazilian gay circuit party history." From that came an invitation to spin with DJ Offer Nissim in Israel, which created a splash for her on the gay party scene. She's a smouldering lesbian who's been embraced by the gay circuit crowd with the same passion gay partiers reserve for gorgeous, muscle-bound DJs.

"I like my music to bring the sexiness out of the people moving to the beats, but that has nothing to do with my sexuality," she says. "Gay house parties are different from straight house parties because gays are happier on the dancefloor. They are more connected to the music and the rhythm – they let me tell my story." the deets

# THE HEART OF GOLDFRAPP

# Bandmate talks of love and ambition on the eve of new record

**GOLDFRAPP HAS NEVER BEEN FOND** of categorization. Throughout their 10-year career, the British duo of Alison Goldfrapp and Will Gregory have earned a reputation for pop ambiguity, shifting from the ambient cinema of their 2000 debut, *Felt Mountain*, to the icy new wave and glam of 2003's *Black Cherry* and 2005's *Supernature*, and the lush folk-pop of *Seventh Tree* in 2008.

Their fifth full-length album, *Head First*, was released on March 23 on Mute Records.

Goldfrapp has become a little less guarded, plunging into the colourful disco fantasia of the 1980s to produce an unambiguously euphoric album territory they've flirted with before, oddly enough.

On Goldfrapp's 2001 tour, the band punctured a set list of *Felt Mountain*'s eerily romantic soundscapes with a cover of Olivia Newton-John's "Let's Get Physical." This time, the perky pop icon's melancholic musical *Xanadu* was a direct inspiration.

"I love Olivia Newton-John," frontwoman Alison Goldfrapp says over the phone from London. "Probably because I feel like when I look at her, she's completely the opposite of me: she's kind of sweet and lovely and looks really innocent and fresh and gorgeous, and she's probably really nice and wholesome.

"I'm the complete opposite!" she laughs.

Written and recorded over six months in a West Country house, *Head First's* nine songs mix acoustic instrumentation, synthesizers and spacy sound effects with breezy melodies and breathy, intimate vocals that float and drift over pared-down propulsive beats.

"These songs are all quite optimistic and celebratory, anthemic at times," she says. "I think they're quite unselfconscious."

Asked if the music of the band's previous four albums was more selfconscious, Goldfrapp pauses and chooses her words carefully.

"I think the music we've done in the past has maybe been more ambiguous and more thoughtful in its sentiment," she says. "['Head first' means] to go into something without fear — head first in love. It's not trivial. I think it's

more celebratory. Maybe music we've done in the past hasn't been as celebratory or as direct."

*Head First*'s lead single, the cheerfully caustic "Rocket," has drawn comparisons to Van Halen's "Jump," while its video casts the singer as a sultry sadist who gleefully straps a victim to a glittering, purple-tipped rocket and launches it into outer space.

Only on the final track does

Goldfrapp cut loose from the pop format, with an ambient choral soundpiece called "Voicething."

Goldfrapp is planning a live show in support of *Head First*, but says it's too early to reveal any details. She is busy overseeing artwork, designing costumes and prepping for TV appearances in Europe. All of that leaves little time for side-projects, though she and Gregory did manage to clock studio time with Christina Aguilera in Los Angeles last year.

The pop starlet tapped Goldfrapp and several other indie acts to work on new material, but the results remain shrouded in mystery. Goldfrapp penned one song but never finished it and has no idea whether it will see the light of day.


"She was very lovely and very relaxed, and it was all in her little room at the back of her garden," she says. "I thought we were going to go into this big, flashy studio with her people around, and it wasn't like that at all."

As Goldfrapp's music has become less ambiguous, so too have the details of her personal life. In an article from December 2009 (ridiculously called "The rise of mid-life lesbians"), the UK's *Times* newspaper outed Goldfrapp's relationship with film editor Lisa Gunning. When a reporter from the same paper asked if she was a lesbian two months later, she replied: "My sexuality is the same as my music and my life. Why does it need a label?"

"I've always been like that, since I was a kid," she says. "It's always been an instinctive, natural thing. I've always had that sense that anything's possible, anything goes and that there are no black and whites."

ARDON ME IF I TALK ABOUT myself for a second. A few weeks ago, while most of

Canada was losing its collective mind over the final hockey game of the Olympics, I was performing the finale of the show I co-created for the Rhubarb Festival at Buddies in Bad Times. Closing night, decked out in a costume made from purple velvet and thousands of mirror bits (I shouldknow, I glued them all by hand), I watched as rays of light reflected from my body and lit up the room. The beams played around the audience, made up mostly of members of Toronto's queer creative community.

From my vantage point on the stage, I could make out drag queens, DJs, actors, producers, club kids, singers, writers, performance artists, dancers, activists and promoters - all fellow denizens of the dark.

Creatures of the night, we are. We dress up to play and work when the sun goes down. We look best under candles or strobe lights, black lights, follow spots and other artificial lighting. We wake up when most people are having lunch, and instead of being out on the street screaming for "our" hockey team (last time I checked, Sidney Crosby played for an American team the other 50 weeks of the year), we were in a theatre/club space revelling in queerness.

This is an incredible time to be in Toronto.

I didn't always feel this way. I spent a few years living out my New York City dream and came back thoroughly convinced Toronto was the last place I wanted to be.

It seemed like the city was in retrograde. The boom days of the '90s theatre scene went bust along with Livent. Club life was repetitive and in need of something new and exciting. The village was minutes away from flat-lining,

and then where would we go? I was jealous of other cities that had visible movements and identifiable movers and shakers who stayed out past 2am. Why were all the cool parties in other cities? How come there wasn't an explosion of late-night art and culture and fierceness? And by fierceness, I mean aggressive and wild, not the watered-down gay-speak of "this moisturizer is fiiiiieeeeerce, hunny."

Where was a scene that wasn't homogenous, but diverse and exciting? Well, it turns out our mothers were right: patience is a virtue.

If I had known that a sexy venue like Goodhandy's was coming just around the corner, I wouldn't have complained. If I had known that Les Blues collective would shake up politics and performance so beautifully; if I had known the queer community would expand way beyond Church St to Parkdale, Danforth, the Junction and beyond; if I knew that my fellow creatures of the night were about to make Toronto the place to be, I would have chilled out.

After all, what other city has Buddies and the AGO and the Gladstone and Fly and Queen's Park and Pussy Palace and Kensington Market and the 3am Queen streetcar and more club promoters than you can shake a flyer at?

Slowly, quietly, but impressively, our belle epoque has arrived, and it's no coincidence it's most visible at night.

Look at the explosion of the vogue scene over the past few years. Look at all the queer burlesque groups. Look at the musicians who are touring and putting out CDs. Look at the smaller club nights that are proving more fun than the mega-clubs. Look at the people who stay up until wake-up calls on CP24 to give you a good time.

Anyone who can't see that a queer culture renaissance is happening is missing out. Whether I'm skulking in the shadows or on centre stage, I'll be soaking it all in. See you in the dark.
